THE MODOC WAR.

THE PEACE COMMISSION GIVES IT UP—THE SOLDIERS IN THE LAVA BEDS—CAPTAIN JACK'S MEN WELL SUPPLIED WITH ICE, BEER AND ROOTS.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 13.

The Peace Commissioners have given the Modocs up, and the military are in full control.

NEW YORK, March 13.

FOREIGN NEWS.

ENGLAND.

THE DEFEAT OF THE GLADSTONE MINISTRY—"WHAT WILL THE OPPOSITION DO WITH IT?"

LONDON, March 13.

The journals this morning comment at great length on the defeat of the government on the Irish University Educational Bill, and speculate upon the course Mr. Gladstone will pursue.

The Tories say the cabinet will probably resign to day and Disraeli will be called by the Queen to form a new ministry, in which event parliament will be dissolved and a general election ordered before July.

The Post says the Government has not determined whether it will resign or dissolve parliament and appeal to the crown to do.

The vote on Gladstone's bill was a great surprise to the Cabinet and liberal members of the House of Commons. The latter was dubious of upholding the ministry by a vote of confidence. The conservatives are unwilling to accept the responsibility of a dissolution of Parliament.

The session of the House of Commons to-day is looked forward to with great anxiety, as Mr. Gladstone will then announce the course decided upon by the ministry.

NEW YORK, March 13.

ANOTHER DESTRUCTIVE LAMP CONFLAGRATION.

ST. LOUIS, March 13.

The National Bank, the extensive dry goods and shoe house of Lamb & Co., the Journal office, and tea or fifteen other buildings, constituting a part of the business portion of Tuscola, Illinois, were destroyed by fire on Tuesday night. Loss estimated at over one hundred thousand dollars. The fire was caused by the explosion of a lamp.

THREATENING ICE GORGE.

PORT DEPOSIT, March 13—noon.

FROM WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, March 13.

The Attorney General has a dispatch from Detective Whitley that the postmaster and county officers have been driven from Lake City, Florida. One leader in the affray has been arrested. Federal officers are investigating the affair.

It is reported that Dr. Newman, Chaplain of the Senate, has been appointed Inspector of casualties and will make a tour round the world.

The deficiency appropriations have compelled a draft on the legal reserve of \$1,200,000. It is reported it may be necessary to use \$1,000,000, but only temporarily.

The Southern claims passed upon by the Commission, and for which appropriate measures have been made, aggregate \$200,000, distributed among about one thousand claimants, mostly in Virginia, Tennessee and Alabama. Deducting eight larger cases, the average is \$400.

President Grant has gone to Philadelphia will return to-morrow.

Mr. West submitted a resolution compensating McMillan and Ray, elected from Louisiana. Referred to the Committee on Privileges and Elections.

"NEW HAMPSHIRE ELECTION.

CONCORD, March 13.

The latest footing of the Congressional vote in the first district gives Small, rep., between 200 and 300 majority. The other districts are democratic. Shaw's (rep.) majority for Governor will be between 300 and 400.

SHOCKING MURDER OF AN AMERICAN IN FRANCE.

NEW YORK, March 13.

It appears that John G. Warren, of Brooklyn, who was agent for a mercantile house at Bayonne, France, was shockingly murdered there, February 14th, by a Spaniard whom he had discharged from his employment for stealing. The murderer stabbed Warren to the heart in broad daylight while promenading with his daughter and she died in her arms on the road. The murderer was arrested. Mr. Warren has relatives at Portland, Maine.

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GERMAN AFRICAN EXPLORATION.

LONDON, March 13.

The German Geological Society propose to send an expedition to explore Western Africa and supplement its discoveries of Livingston. Considerable sums of money have been already raised to meet the expenses of the undertaking.

FINANCIAL CLAIMS IN UCUA.

HABANA, March 13.

The Directors of the Political Club and the Spanish Consul invited a number of wealthy citizens and leading financiers to a conference on Monday evening, at which the condition of the treasury was taken under consideration. The Directors submitted a proposal in view of the issuance of the \$10,000,000 loan, that the portion which remained unclaimed be divided among the tax payers according to the amount of tax paid by each. The Directors stated the cause would also advantage to introduce a plan in the consideration of the property holders and money men of the island.

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
