CAPTIONS OF PUBLIC ACTS AND RESOLUTIONS

Passed at the Session of the General Assembly of North Carolina, 1872-73.

[The Acts and Resolutions took effect at the date of their publication, except where otherwise stated. The dates of the Acts and Resolutions are the dates of ratification.]

ACTS. To provide four terms of Wake Superior Court—first Monday in January and June, eighth Monday after the second Monday in February and August. Dec. 3, 1872.

Concerning the election of Judges.—Hereafter to be elected by the voters in the several judicial districts. Dec. 14, 1872.

To re-enact and amend chap. 193, Laws of 1871-72, entitled "An Act to establish the rates of the public printing and for other purposes." Dec. 17, 1872.

To incorporate the N. C. Life Insurance Company, of Raleigh capital stock not to exceed \$1,000,000. Dec. 17, 1872.

To regulate the salaries of Governor and Treasurer—gives the former \$4,000 the latter \$3,000 per year. December 17, 1872.

To change the spring term of Cabarrus Superior Court to the first Monday in July each year. Dec. 17, 1872.

To keep in force the Code of Civil Procedure till otherwise provided by law. Dec. 18, 1872.

To amend the charter of the Wilmington and Planters Railroad Company.—Allows this company to consolidate with the Atlantic and Pacific Seaboard Railway, with all the powers of the original charter. Dec. 18, 1872.

To charter the Wilson and Tar River narrow gauge Railroad. Capital stock \$500,000, to construct a narrow gauge railroad from Wilson to Tar River at or near Greenville. Dec. 18, 1872.

To re-enact and continue in force the charter of the Florence Railroad Company and the several acts amendatory thereto, and to amend the same. Legalized subscriptions on the part of individuals and corporations. Dec. 18, 1872.

To incorporate the New York, Norfolk and Chesapeake Railroad Company. Capital stock \$5,000,000 to construct a road from the Virginia line to the South Carolina line in the direction of Columbia. Authorizes the company to lease existing roads, to issue bonds, &c. Dec. 18, 1872.

To extend the time for taking out grants in McDowell county to the first of July, 1872. Dec. 19, 1872.

For the support of Insane Asylum for 1872.—Appropriates \$70,000 for the purpose. Dec. 19, 1872.

To repeal chapter 89, Laws of 1871-72. The act of 1872 allowed the Commissioners of Stokes, Rockingham and Chowan counties, in their discretion, to pay over-seers of roads, not exceeding \$2 per day. January 18, 1873.

To exempt the counties of Ashe, Watauga, Alleghany, Jackson and Swain from the provisions of chap. 142, Laws 1867-70. The act of 1870 makes it a misdemeanor to take mountain trout between the 1st of April and the 15th of October, by shooting or otherwise, and to catch them by seining at any time. January 18, 1873.

To amend the consolidation of the Carolina Narrow Gauge Railroad Company, and the Chesapeake and Loudon Narrow Gauge Railroad Company, in South Carolina. Authorizes such consolidation, if the same be approved by the members of the several companies. January 23, 1873.

To cure certain defects in the registration of deeds and other written instruments in Buncombe county. Declares void the acts of A. F. Sumner, Register of Deeds. January 28, 1873.

To incorporate the Albemarle and Seaport Steamboat Transportation Joint Stock Company, with a capital of \$50,000, to build, repair and run steamboats and other craft on Seaport river, and other waters of North Carolina. January 24, 1873.

To incorporate the Snow Hill, Greenville and Goldsboro Railroad Company. Capital stock \$1,000,000, to construct a railroad from Goldsboro in Greenville, by Snow Hill, and from Goldsboro to P-ay-steville. January 25, 1873.

To prevent the felling of trees in New River and its tributaries, Stony Creek and Treedy Fork, in Alamance county. Hired January 27, 1873.

Concerning the town of Goldsboro, in Wayne county. Authorizes the Board of Commissioners to prevent the erection of wooden buildings in certain cases. January 27, 1873.

To amend an act, entitled "An act to enable any number of persons not less than three to become incorporated." Declares the holding of real estate to 200 acres. Jan. 17, 1873.

To amend an act to incorporate the Wilmington Insurance Company.—Concerning the notes and bonds taken for premiums on insurance. Jan. 28, 1873.

In relation to depositions. In suits before a justice of the peace, either party may apply to the clerk of the court, obtain a commission and take the deposition of any one whose evidence he desires. Deposition to be returned to clerk and by him passed upon. Jan. 28, 1873.

For the relief of the Sheriffs and Tax Collectors. They are authorized to conduct the taken amount. Jan. 28, 1873.

In relation to depositions. In suits before a justice of the peace, either party may apply to the clerk of the court, obtain a commission and take the deposition of any one whose evidence he desires. Deposition to be returned to clerk and by him passed upon. Jan. 28, 1873.
