This inceused Foster, and he opened the door again, which was immediately closed by Mr. Putnam. When the car reached Thirtieth street Poster came inside, and remarking that he had paid his fare and was entitled to a seat, sat down close beside Miss Duval. He then behaved in a brutish manner, and made a noise with his lips which induced the young lady to change her seat. Mr. Putnam then intefered, and said although Foster was entitled to a seat in the car, yet be would not suffer the ladies in his charge to be insuited.
