EXTENSION OF MORGAN STREET. Mr. Kemp P. Battle, Middle Ward, said, as chairman of the committee on the extension of Morgan street to Boyput away, and our reporter, Purcell, says lan, he had been investigating this matter, and entered into a lengthy exponition of the manner in which the property affected by the proposed extension had been transferred from one owner to another, several times. He said :

"The effect of opening that street to Boylan will be to compel the railroad company to bridge the cut. And it will cause some inconvenience to Mr. Root, because it will take away a part of his garden, but, then, for damage he can fall back on the railroad company which gave

"The committee think that the street ught to be opened to Hoylan street, fo the reason there is but that one way of easily getting out west from the city. And it will be a very greatly needed thoroughfare when the new fair ground is opened. The committee think the ex pense of opening the street ought not to be much because assessors would probaoly say it would cohance the value of the Boylan property instead of incurring damage.
