DOMESTIC NEWS.

DR. NEWMAN PROVIDED FOR.

WASHINGTON, March 30. It was yesterday ascertained at an official source that Rev. Dr. Newman will be appointed inspector of consulates in Japan, China, and the eastern countries.

SCHOONER LOST.

CAPE MAY, March 30. The schooner Clara Davidson, from Leschville, (T) N. C., is ashore on Cold Spring bar. Four passengers and the crew were saved.

COTTON SWINDLE.

New York, March 31. Several prominent cotton merchants here have been victimized by one William Meade, who shipped 136 bales of cotton hence to Philadelphia per steamer Equator, on Friday last. The cotton is said to have been fraudulently obtained, and the losers want all persons against negotiating the bills of exchange for the cotton.

SPANISH EMANCIPATION.

HAVANA, March 31. The Fois de Cuba, commenting on abolition in Porto Rico, disapproves payment for the emancipated slaves from the revenues of the Island. It thinks the saving to the national treasury will not compensate for what the country will lose in a political sense. It thinks, also, that three years is too long for the slaves to remain under their masters.

The Consular says the law is the best that could be procured under the circumstances. The Diario thanks the ministry for introducing the three year clause, but has nothing further to say.

Government and State dull and steady.

FOREIGN NEWS.

IMPORTANT FROM SPAIN.

MADRID, March 31. The Carlists have captured Berga with five hundred prisoners. The Diario de Barcelona says many other places must follow as the troops are paralyzed by insubordination and are unable to render assistance to the garrisons. The Carlists after several skirmishes hold Ripoll. The troops retired to Gual. The Madrid women's meeting was a failure. The federalist meeting was orderly. A deputation visited the Minister of the Interior demanding the demolition of the monarchical municipalities. The Minister replied that the Government had no power to overthrow the regularly appointed authorities of cities.

[SECOND DISPATCH.]

MADRID, March 31. Barcelona dispatches represent the situation as grave. It is stated the Carlists burned Berga after capturing the town. Crowds were assembled in the streets of Barcelona, with threats of reprisals against the clergy, and the Carlist sympathizers were threatened by the Government to remain the people.

GENERAL NEWS.

Key West, March 31. The Cubans have captured Mesavilla, an important point on the east coast. Washington, March 31. Postmaster-General Cassell and Secretary Howe and Cameron make a southern tour to inspect the postal-car service. These gentlemen also seek health from southern sunny breezes.

A negro and a pair of males he was driving were killed by lightning in Ann Bruden county, Md.

A boat was in Philadelphia on Saturday evening. Trees and fences and signs were damaged. No personal injuries reported.

Charles Mortimer who murdered Mary Gibson, at Sacramento, has been sentenced to be hanged.

The commissions to the Georgia postmaster have not yet been issued. They have been referred to the Postmaster-General for full investigation of the question which led to the squabble in the Senate. The commissions will probably not issue for some days, and it is certain changes are verified they will be withdrawn.

The supposed murderer of the Virginia Governor Bain has been arrested. He is an Alexandria, Va., negro. The circumstances of the case are very strong.

GENERAL NEWS.

WASHINGTON, March 30. Internal revenue receipts for the month eight and a half millions. James Brooks' condition is unfavorable to-day. Commissioner Douglas has appointed an engineer to survey the lands in the South sold for direct taxes, with a view to their restoration to the original owners upon the payment of taxes, costs, &c. Canby telegraphs Sherman that he thinks when the avenues of escape are closed and supplies cut off or abridged the Motocs will come in.

NASHVILLE, TENN., April 31. Southerland and Driver's saw mill at Edgefield is burned. Loss \$75,000. No insurance.

MONTE, April 31.

Dr. Josiah C. Nott died on his 69th birthday this morning at 7 1/2 o'clock. Mrs. Charlotte E. Smith, wife of E. DeLafayette Smith, and daughter of R. V. Gilbert Morgan, of S. C., died yesterday.

PANIC IN A CHURCH—SERIOUS ACCIDENTS.

TARENTON, N. J., April 31. During the services for the dead at St. John's Catholic church for Rev. Father Mackin, this morning, the immense crowd was started by a crash which was supposed to be from the giving way of the gallery, and which caused a scene of consternation. The crowd rushed towards the outlet and a number were thrown down and crushed beneath the feet of the mass. Fully ten minutes elapsed before a passage could be cleared, when the wounded were removed to the residences near and physicians summoned.

LATER.

A dozen women and children were found to be seriously wounded; some are in a dangerous condition, but no deaths as yet.

The alarm was caused by the breaking of a kneeling board. The alarm having subsided, the funeral services were resumed.

SOUTH CAROLINA SUPREME COURT SUPREME COURT.

STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA. Ex Rel. Wagner vs. Womser, of Charleston County. The question was whether a tax officer was bound to accept bills of the Bank of South Carolina in payment of taxes, the allegation being that his charter made the bills receivable for all public dues. The County Treasurer answers that the bills were issued in 1861 and in aid of the rebellion, and therefore were not a legal tender; and further, that the charter under which the bills were tendered had been repealed.

DECISION.

The first question was found by the jury in favor of the Bank, but the Court held that the clause requiring the State to receive the bills in payment of taxes was subsequently repealed.

"This ruling is sustained here and the judgment is affirmed."

PANIC IN THE MONEY MARKET.

Sold up to 11 1/2, and closed at 11 5/8. MONEY THREE HUNDRED AND SIXTY-FIVE PER CENT.

BLACK MONDAY.

New York, March 31. Money is very stringent and borrowers on call are forced to pay higher rates than for a long time past. Early in the day all renewals and new loans were at one-sixteenth per cent, but later the price of money rapidly advanced and before 2 o'clock one-half per cent, and interest was paid—or, in plain terms, one hundred and eighty-nine and a half per cent per annum! After that time three quarters per cent. was paid, and before 4 o'clock loans were made at one percent—or three hundred and sixty-five per cent. per annum! Banks were calling in loans to-day, and one institution, banking for the city, called in a large amount, which was one great reason for the stringency.

Exchange is completely demoralized by the advance in gold and the money stringency. Prime bankers sold at 7 1/2, but at the close the quotations were entirely nominal. Gold was very active, opening at 16 3/4 and sold up to 17 1/4 and advanced to 18 1/2, fell to 17 3/4, rallied to 18, and closed at 17 1/2 to 17 5/8. Loans were four to one-sixteenth for currency.

New York, March 31. A private cable dispatch announces the death of Mrs. James Gordon Bennett, at Kensington.

THE STOKES CASE.

New York, March 31. Judge Brady to-day denied the motion to amend the judgment in Stokes' case, and said the proper method was by certiorari, which will bring the case before the general term.

FROM FRANCE.

PARIS, March 31. The Government is sending troops to the Spanish frontier.
