SAN SALVADOR SWALLOWED BY AN EARTHQUAKE.

NIGHT HUNDRED LIVES LOST. TWELVE MILLIONS WORTH OF PROPERTY DESTROYED.

[BY TELEGRAPH TO THE SENTINEL.] ASPINWALL, VIA HAVANA, April 11. The city of San Salvador, the capital of the Central American Republic of that name, has been destroyed by an earthquake, causing a terrible loss of life.
