THE STATE PAIR.

The Encloseure-Contract for erecting

the Buildings-Premiums, &c The Fair of the State Agricultural Se nety will be held at Raleigh on the 18th, 14th, 15th, 16th, 17th and 18th October next-six days. The grounds are nearly enclosed and are being cleared off. The ontract for furnishing 600,000 feet of umber for the buildings will be awarded this week, and the erection of the buildngs will be commenced within ten days. The work of constructing the buildings will be undertaken by the Executive Committee, their purpose being to employ a competent practical builder to hire hands and to superintend the work. By this course the committee expect to save a few thousand dollars. The buildings, it is expected, will be completed in ninety days after their erection shall have been commenced.

The committee propose if found necessur, to negotiate with Capt. Dens n skilled in landscape matters in regard to laying out the grounds.

The tract of land on which the Pair Grounds are located contains sixty acres. fifty-five acres of which will be within the enclosure. The race track will be premely half a mile round.

The location of the grounds, one and a half miles from the city by county road and by railroad, has been most happily hosen. It is one of the most elevated points of land adjacent to the city, being almost on a level with the dome of the capitol, thus ensuring the most delightful breezes from all quarters. The North ar-line Railroad and the Chatham Railroad run side by side within one quarter of a mile of the enclosure, but the Chatham Railroad Company propose to run a track to the englosure and deliver freight and passengers at the grounds. During the Fair trains will be run from the city every ten minutes and the rate of fare will be about ten ceuts, or fifteen for return

During the progress of the work of con. ructing the buildings and until the railroad is extended to the Pair grounds, it is the purpose of the Executive Committee o do their own hauling from the railroad to the grounds, and for this purpose they will purchase wagons and teams, which
