Rachel Whitaker the Accused-Interes

> ARTIQUITY OF MAN .-- Mr. Frank Calvert, of the Dardsnelles, has made an in-teresting discovery, which proves the existence of man during the miocene pe riod of the tertiary age. M. de Tchihatcheff has visited the region where the discovery was made and pronounced it genuise miccens, and drawings of fossil benes, terth, and shells found there, on being sent to Sir John Lubbock, and by him transmitted to Messra. Busk and Jeffreys, were determined to be remains of both of which belong strictly to the mic croe ep ch. From the face of a cliff in the vicinity of the Dardanelles, at a geofigure of a horned quadruped, with arched neck, herenge-shaped chest, long body, straight forelegs and broad feet, the whole design encircling the fragment, which measures nine inches in diameter and five in thickness. Throughout a drift near this place were found stone im-plements and other evidence of man's presence.
