A' Piece of Gov. Tryon's Furniture in Raleigh. from the Mayor's office :

Col. W. H. Harrison, of this city, has inhis possession a piece of furniture, used probably as a dressing table, once the property of Gov. Tryon, " the last of the Royal Governors of North Carolina," and which was doubtless one of the principal ornaments of his palace at Newbern. It s so unlike anything of necessary housenold furniture of the present day, that we shrink from the attempt to describe it; it is, however, a white marble slab resting on a hands mely painted frame, with platform some six to eight inches from the floor, faced with a heavy gilt mouldag-the platform is supported by two round pure white marble columns, the upport at the back being faced with narrow marble slabs in quality similar to the columns. It stands about four and a half feet high, and is about three feet ong by some eighteen inches deep. The workmanship throughout is of the most complete order, and the material of which the table is composed, is as sound as ever, and the paloting and guilding remarkssly fresh

This table was doubtless imported from England, as everything else connected with the building and household was, inluding the brick of which the palace was composed, about the year 1750, and nust then have been regarded as a work f art.
