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THE MODOC WAR.

News from the Front. A HORRID SPECTACLE IN THE LAVA BEDS. HONORABLE LAVA BEDS, April 20. Nothing further has transpired. We are awaiting the return of the cavalry.

The Warm Spring Indians are scouring the country east of the battle-ground, and are working towards the center, which are at the end of a high ledge of the Modoc stronghold south. If the Modocs have fled to this section we will strike the trail, and troops will follow as soon as we are notified.

There were about 220 men, women and children, sixty of whom could fight. Probably fifteen warriors were slain in the three days fight. Yesterday the soldiers captured an old negro who was unable to escape. She contains the death of Schonchin, the second chief, who was shot by Commissioner Meacham.

YREKA, April 21.—James Glenn arrived at 8 o'clock p. m. from the front. He brings dispatches from General Gillon. He left headquarters at 10:30 o'clock yesterday, and reports having been shot at twice when four miles this side of camp by Indians, but was untouched.

Col. Meacham's command has been ordered to move by way of Shasta valley, instead of by Pitt river route. An additional list of killed and wounded in the battle of the 16th, at the lava beds: Private J. M. Jones, First Cavalry, a finger of his right hand shot away; Private H. P. Martineau, Battery E, Fourth Artillery, shot through the right leg; Private Wm. Cunningham, Battery E, Fourth Artillery, shot through the small of his back; Robert A. Dallas, Indian, shot in the calf of the leg; Private Harry Dean, Battery E, Fourth Artillery, shot dead on the field and scalped; Private Morgan, Company G, Tenth Infantry, wounded in the calf of the leg; Sergeant Conroy, Battery E, Fourth Artillery, shot through the head and died on the field.

A correspondent of the London Illustrated Press arrived yesterday. The Warm Spring Indians will start to hunt the Modocs, and will be defeated on Saturday. The Modocs are not far from Yreka. The country is in a great ferment.
