THE STRIKERS.

The Meeting Last Night. A meeting of the strikers connected with the building trades of this city took place at the Court House last night, Joe P. Prairie in the chair, and Geo. Taylor acting as secretary.

Haywood Spencer, col., was called upon to explain the objects of the meeting. Every other city, he said, had its hours of labor regulated and he did not see why Raleigh should not.

Keith was next called on. He was a mechanic, he said, and loved the case of the mechanical interests.

Henry Jones, col., followed. He got all he asked in the way of wages and worked on the ten hour principle, and therefore did not know what to say.

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Supreme Court.

The June term of the Supreme Court of the State will commence in this city on the 23d prox.

The following is the order in which the business of the court will be taken up: First week, 1st and 2nd Districts; Second week, 4th and 5th Districts; Third week, 3rd and 7th Districts; Fourth week, 8th and 9th Districts; Fifth week, 10th and 11th Districts; Sixth week, 12th and 6th Districts.

1st. The counsel for the appellant shall have the right to address the Court for not over two hours, which shall include both his opening argument and reply.

2nd. The counsel for the appellee shall be allowed not over one hour.

3rd. The time occupied in reading so much of the record as may be necessary, shall not be counted under the above rules.

4th. The time for argument allowed above may be extended by the Court in proper cases, provided the extension be allowed before the argument begins.

5th. Any number of counsel will be heard on either side within the limits of time above prescribed, but it is required, that when several counsel speak, each shall confine himself to a distinct part or parts of the argument so as to avoid tedious repetition.

6th. Every appellant, at the time of settling the case, or if there be no case within ten days after the appeal, shall file in the Clerk's office, his exceptions to the judgment or proceedings, briefly stated and numbered.

7th. No cases will be heard until there shall be put in the margin of the record brief references to such parts of the text as it is necessary to consider for a decision of the case.

8th. The costs of copies of unnecessary and irrelevant testimony or of other irrelevant matters, need not be explained by the appellant, unless in all cases charged to the appellant, unless it appears expressly that they were sent up by the appellant, in which case the costs shall be taxed on him.

9th. In every case the appellant before the hearing, shall file with the clerk, one or more written or printed briefs, in which shall be set forth the exceptions taken by him. Under each shall be briefly stated so much of the pleadings, case agreed, or other finding of facts, as will make it intelligible. Also if several acts of Assembly are relied on, a citation of them by date and chapter. Also the authorities in law principally relied on.

10th. If the above brief shall be printed, eight copies shall be delivered to the clerk, five for each of the Justices, one for the Clerk in file with the record, and one for the reporter, and one for the opposite counsel.

11th. Whenever printed briefs shall be filed, and the matter in controversy equals or exceeds \$500, the costs of such briefs shall be taxed in the costs in favor of the party filing them, if he be successful, at the rate of five cents for each printed page of the usual size of the reports of this Court.

12th. The appellee may in like manner file such briefs and shall under like circumstances be entitled to have the costs thereof taxed for him.
