NEWS SPLINTERS. Ten million dollars worth of diamonds was the product of South Africa last year. Cincinnati has about completed a public library building nearly twice as large as that of Boston. There are more short-horn breed, led and graded in England than all the other breeds put together. The German Emperor has determined that the office of Catholic Bishop of the Prussian army shall be abolished. The United States grows annually about 100,000,000 bushels of potatoes—three bushels for every man, woman and child. Octopus, the biggest animal known in the world, was secured for the first time by Dr. Reiss on the 31st of last November. There are 231 students in the seven Congregational theological seminaries in the United States—forty-three more than last year. The Congress of Missouri, in Switzerland, have decided that the degree of faculty shall not be taught since in the charter of the school.

Feast of Pentecost. The Jewish festival called Pentecost, or the Feast of Weeks, was generally observed by our Israelite citizens on Saturday last. The Hebrew name of the festival is Shabuoth, and each of the four letters in the original, which form the word, denote a special reason for the celebration of the feast. There, represents Shaboth, the Feast of Weeks. Both Shaboth and Pentecost, the Feast of the Firstfruits—Agave, for Agave, the daily Communion, which every Israelite who could do so, hearkened to Jerusalem and the Temple. They, for Yeshu, the Law. The festival is held in commemoration of the giving of the Law—on Mount Sinai, and begins on the sixth day of the third month, called Sivan, at which time the Jews were wont to assemble around the Holy Mount and bring with them offerings, the first fruits, or produce of their crops.

DEATH OF CHIEF-JUSTICE CHASE. The list of jurors having been called, District Attorney Badger said: "If the court please, I rise to announce the death of Chief Justice Salmon P. Chase, who departed this life, in the city of New York, on the 8th day of May last. I ask, in the name of the Bar, that out of high consideration for his illustrious and pure life and from respect to the office, which for nine years, he so ably and successfully filled you honor to add your name to this court."

On motion Judge Fowle a meeting of the Bar was then organized by calling Hon. B. F. Moore to the chair. Messrs. R. H. Battle and T. M. Argo were requested to act as secretaries. On motion of Mr. Badger, a committee of five, consisting of the following members of the Bar, was appointed to draft resolutions, to wit: Judge Battle, Judge Fowle, and Messrs. R. C. Badger, G. V. Strong, and Neil McKay. On motion of Col. Thos. Fuller, the meeting adjourned over to Tuesday 9th inst., at 10 a. m., at which time the committee were requested to report.

The Gettysburg Dead. The remains of three hundred and thirty-three Confederates who were killed in the battle of Gettysburg, were brought to Richmond and buried at Hollywood cemetery. There was a large procession of military and citizens, the streets were draped in mourning and decorated with inscriptions commemorative of the heroic dead. Ten thousand people were at the cemetery. Appropriate ceremonies were observed. We gave the names of the North Carolinians the other day. The Richmond Enquirer gave a touching article on the heroic dead with the following patriotic passage: "Virginia takes to her bosom the injured dead of her own sons and their brave brothers who fell fighting by their sides at Gettysburg, she weeps over them as the boys in grief over their graves, and while time flows she will not forget them. But she remembers that she has a future as well as a past—that she owes duties to the living as well as to the dead, and in the presence of such scenes as that of Hollywood yesterday evening, instead of being filled with bitter, burning remembrance and vindictive hate, she rises from her prayers, and in Christian charity, kindly courage, and noble fidelity to her pledges, turns to the North and to the South and wishes a reunion of hearts as well as hands, at the altar of a common country."

Recaptured. About the latter part of June last, a negro named Ben Johnson was arrested and confined in Wake county jail charged with stealing Harness &c., from several in this city. About the first of May he escaped from jail pending his trial. The Wilmington Post of the 30th ult., tells the balance: "Last night Sheriff Black received information from the Sheriff of Wake county, that one Ben Jones who escaped from the jail in that county, where he was confined on a charge of larceny, was somewhere in this city, and accordingly, with the promptness which characterizes that official, he detailed Messrs. Howze and Bagley two of his deputies, to search for him and their labors were not without success. Ben was found at work in Capt. Southerland's livery stable, and when he saw the officers, with the shrewdness of such chaps, he divined their business and made a dash for the "fresh fields and pastures new," but the deputies were fleet of foot, and after an exciting chase, he was bagged and taken to jail, much to his disgust. Ben says he did not break out of Wake county jail, but only left. Messrs. Howze and Bagley deserve much praise for their promptness and energy."
