The Bible Cause in Gates County. A meeting of the Gates County Bible Society was held in the Baptist Church, Gatesville on Thursday, June 12th. After an address by the Rev. P. A. Strobel, the following officers were chosen: President—Hance Hooper. Corresponding Secretary—R. B. G. Cooper. Treasurer and Depository—R. H. Williams. Executive Committee—M. L. Eure, M. Hays and T. H. Lassiter.

This Society was re-organized in March, 1872. Up to that time it was without books and had done nothing since the war. A grant was obtained from the Parent Society and a small purchase of books was made for the Depository.

During the year just closed, this Society has distributed by sale and donation four hundred and fifty (450) volumes of the Scriptures, supplying seventy destitute families and fourteen Sabbath Schools. The receipts from sales and collections during the year amounted to \$70, against \$3.87 the previous year. This shows a very marked improvement in the Bible cause in Gates county, for which the brethren who have had charge of the work deserve to be commended. The brethren have promised to address themselves with renewed earnestness to the work and to complete the canvass and supply of the county as early as day.

Wake County Finances. We have before us a printed copy of the financial condition of Wake county as set forth by the Commissioners. The amount total from which the revenue of the county is derived, and the amount collected in the year 1872, is \$38,404.98. The rate of taxation on the poll is 55 cents; on the \$100 of property 35 cents.

William M. Brown, County Treasurer, states that T. F. Lee, Sheriff, owes a balance of \$28,416.47.

The School Fund received \$4,324.37 from the State. Balance in hands of Treasurer, \$41.67.

To this fund property belongs \$2,072, being three months of the County Poll Tax for the year 1873; and the further sum of \$7,437.35, State Poll Tax for the years 1871-72, making a total amount, without interest, \$10,509.
