DOMESTIC NEWS.

FROM ARKANSAS.

LITTLE ROCK, June 20.
The wet weather is unfavorable to crops. Raised every day for a month in some counties.

FROM CUBA.

HAVANA, June 20.
Only two hundred negroes having offered to work on the trocha, a large part of the army in the central department is still required to complete the work. It has been decided that there is no necessity for the third trocha. When the first and second are completed all the Spanish force in the field will be concentrated in the eastern department.

FROM NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, June 20.
Warrants for the arrests have not yet been issued under the new ring indictments, and the District Attorney says none will be served until Monday, on which day the Court of Oyer and Terminer will be in session. Nobody seems to regard the indictments as anything more than part of a bitter political fight now on hand.

The United States Marshal's office completed the service of subpoenas yesterday in equity suit against the Union Pacific Railroad Company, the Credit Mobilier of America and others. Some of the respondents are in Europe, and were subpoenaed through their counsel. The name of the importer who is charged with attempting to defraud the government out of a large amount of duties on Mexican shawls is J. Allis.

Several cases of mixed goods and a quantity of black lace were taken in South street and elsewhere on yesterday, by the Customs officers, and a heavy seizure also was made in Baltic Street, Brooklyn, pending appeal in the suit of James Reid & Co., to set aside judgment for \$75,000—value of cargo of whiskey entered at the Custom House by means of alleged fraudulent practices. Reference was obtained by the government to determine whether the whiskey has been entered without intentional fraud. At the resumption of reference yesterday the ex-guager, John C. Strong, testified that when he was in the custom house Mr. Jayne threatened to lock him up in Ludlow street jail, if he refused to sign a certificate paper, the contents of which were not disclosed, and to escape prosecution did sign it, and that subsequently was told by Jayne, that he (witness) would lose his place if he could not remember that Reid & Co. had offered to bribe him to under guage the whiskey question.

COTTON MILLS BURNED.

BALTIMORE, June 20.
The Mount Vernon cotton mills, Wm. Kennedy, President, have been burned. Loss \$200,000.

OUTLAW ARRESTED.

OWENSBURG, KY., June 20.
The outlaw Hagan has been arrested. He gives 80 names of a band of robbers working between Pendleton county, Ohio, through Kentucky, Virginia and North Carolina.

FROM MISSOURI.

ST. LOUIS, June 20.
Harris and Thomas Gutherie & Co., Chestnut, Dragoon & Co., provision dealers, have failed. Their stock and contracts aggregate six million pounds meat—12,000 hds. pork.

FROM LONDON.

LONDON, June 20.
The Shah of Persia visits Victoria, as Windsor to-day.
A special from Madrid says the conservative of the Cortes are seeking to establish a Unitarian Republic with Serrano as President.

A dispatch from the Great Eastern at noon states that six hundred and four miles of cable had been paid out, and that the ship was thus in latitude 22° 33', longitude 24° 44'.

FROM NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, June 20.
The expected payment without notice of July interest begins in a few days. Southern State bonds at record rate on business of \$200,000.

As a result of the death of Horace F. Clark, the Union Pacific opened at 22, having closed yesterday at 24, and has since fluctuated between 22 and 24. Lake shore has fluctuated between 21 1/2 and 22 1/4 and has been comparatively little affected. The Post says that Horace F. Clark was undoubtedly a victim of over work, having for years borne a responsible and active part in many corporations. At the time of his death he was President of the Lake Shore & Michigan Southern R. R. Co., and Union Pacific R. R. Co. He was Director in many companies among which were the N. Y. Central & Hudson, New York & Harlem, New York & New Haven, and Hartford, Toledo, Walworth and Western, Erie & Pittsburgh, Danbury, Waterbury and Paterson, and the Western Union Telegraph Co., besides several banks and insurance companies.

FROM BALTIMORE.

BALTIMORE, June 20.
Total loss of the Mt. Vernon Cotton Mill over one fourth of a million. The building was of stone, 138 feet long, 40 feet wide, 5 stories high, valuable machinery and stock completely destroyed.

DEATH OF A PROMINENT CITIZEN.

NEW YORK, June 20.
Horace F. Clark, son-in-law of Commodore Vanderbilt, died in this city yesterday of rheumatism of the heart, in the eightieth year of his age. He was member of 35th and 36th Congresses, and since his retirement from politics he has been identified with business interests in this city and railroad progress, and development of the West.

Judge Ingram in the Supreme Court, has granted an absolute divorce in the case of Pauline Leuca against her husband Baron Van Rhoda, with leave to marry again. The plaintiff was also awarded the custody of their child.

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FROM PHILADELPHIA.

PHILADELPHIA, June 20.
Hugh Smith who attempted to swim the Schoolhouse was drowned.

Two girls aged five were found locked in the closet of a valiant house, had been missing every since Wednesday. One survives. A terrible crime apprehended.

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FROM WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, June 20.
Robeson's plan regarding the Polaris is endorsed.

The pardon of Wm. McIntyre, convicted of Kukluxing is recommended. He has suffered three-fourths of two years sentence at Albany.

Grant confirms the decision not to return the Kickapoo women and children captured by McKenzie. The settlers in the vicinity killed three Iamoth Indians.

FROM MASSACHUSETTS.

BOSTON, June 20.
The case of Gasaway B. Lamar against Albert G. Browne and others, an action of the fort for the conversion of 1,800 bales of cotton valued at \$500,000, which plaintiff claims the defendants took from him in Ga., in 1865, and which has been on trial in the U. S. Circuit Court for the past week, closed yesterday. Judge Clempson, after the evidence was closed, ruled that as the evidence was contradictory, that the cotton was turned over by the military to the defendants, who claimed they were appointed special agents of the Treasury to take charge of the captured and abandoned property in the seceding States, no action could be maintained by the plaintiff, and directed the verdict for defendants subject to revision by the Supreme Court of the United States.
