## Domestic News.

### THE WALWORTH TRIAL.

New York, June 24.

The Walworth murder trial opened this morning. The court was crowded. Young Walworth's mother and two of his younger brothers sat near him; also Rev. Mr. Backhouse, Presbyterian minister and husband of Mrs. Walworth's sister. Several friends of the family were also in the court-room. The work of getting a jury has been commenced.

### CHOLERA.

Washington, June 24.

At Nashville 37 deaths whereof 29 were colored. Cincinnati 5 deaths were reported at the health office. At Memphis it is disappearing. At Wheeling one death.

### FROM NEW ORLEANS.

New Orleans, June 24.

The jury in the alleged attempt to assassinate the Louisiana gubernatorial chair consists of two whites and ten blacks. Kellogg himself is on the witness stand.

### FROM NEW YORK.

New York, June 24.

Marshal Matzel has the warrants for the arrest of the members of the ring under recent indictments. They will probably be served to-day.

The Junta sails to-day in search of the Polaris with an abundant supply of coal and provisions.

The board of health is taking every precaution against cholera. The residents of damp cellar are compelled to vacate. At a special meeting of the association of Donmarum, an Italian society, last evening, resolutions were passed calling upon the American government to stop the inhuman traffic in Italian children. The other Italian societies are expected to unite in this call upon the government.

### FROM WASHINGTON.

Washington, June 24.

Senator West to-day called upon Gen. Humphreys, Chief of Engineers, and ascertained that he was favorably impressed with the report of Major Howard on the "Fort St. Phillip Canal." It being a matter of such magnitude, however, the project will be submitted to a board of engineers for their opinion. A final report from Gen. Humphreys may be looked for when Congress convenes.

### WAREHOUSE BURNED.

Cincinnati, June 24.

The tobacco warehouse of Dr. E. R. W. Thomas, in the southern outskirts of Covington, Ky., containing 400,000 pounds of tobacco in leaf and in hogheads, was burned early this morning. The tobacco is valued at about \$80,000 and is insured for \$50,000, mostly in local companies. The building is valued at \$12,000 and was uninsured.

### FROM INDIANA.

Evansville, June 24.

The report of health officers shows that thirteen cases of cholera have occurred in this city since the disease first appeared two weeks ago. Investigation shows there have been several deaths out of the above number.

## DOMESTIC NEWS.

### FINANCIAL.

New York, June 24.

Stocks very dull. Government bonds, which keep pace with gold, are higher to-day, with market dull. The only sales in Southern bonds at the Board was \$30,000 new Tennessee. The Stock market has, on the whole, been barely steady, with prices lower than yesterday, and with transactions on a restricted scale.

### THE CHOLERA.

Nashville, June 24.

There were 29 deaths, including 8 whites. The people are more hopeful and business is improving.

### FROM WASHINGTON.

Washington, June 24.

The State of Peru will not visit America, it being too far.

The national banks require a report of their condition by the 15th of July.

Twelve months ago an increase over the previous year in the cotton average was reported. The per centage of increase in a State is found by dividing the aggregate of increase in the counties by the number reported, it is a rate, too high. The increase indicated is in Virginia 23 per cent., in North Carolina and Georgia 14, in South Carolina 2, in Florida 2, in Alabama 9, Mississippi and Louisiana 4, Texas 21, Arkansas 10, Tennessee 15. This makes the average increase in the cotton States, reckoned in the same way, is nearly 13 per cent.

### FROM OHIO.

Columbus, July 24.

In the case of the exclusion of the Bible from the common schools in Cincinnati, the Supreme Court to-day decided that the school board had a right to pass a resolution to exclude not only the Bible and singing, but religious questions, and the court has no right to interfere with their decision in the exercise of this power.

### FROM SPAIN.

Madrid, June 24.

The War Department has advice of the defeat by the republican troops of the

United bands of the Carlist leaders Eli Dorreguy and Ollo. The insurgents lost 60 killed and 300 wounded.

It was officially announced this morning that the troops in the North, under Gen. Novillo, defeated a force of Carlists on Friday last, inflicting a severe loss.

The life of Edward Bulwer Lytton is to be written by his son Robert, better known as "Owen Meredith," and author of "Utopia," "The Ring of Amasis," and much poetic literature.

William Cullen Bryant's equanimity is frequently disturbed by calamity, as allusions to "Thanatos" as the best poem he has ever written. As he produced "Thanatos" before he was 19, the venerable bard regards such allusions as anything but pleasant.
