DOMESTIC NEWS.

KILLED BY LIGHTNING.

CARDO, Ill., July 9.

A lad, driving a reaper with two horses, was fatally hurt by lightning. Several men and horses have been killed.

FROM NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, July 9.

The Secretary of the Board of Health states that no previous year since 1869 shows the hygienic condition of the corresponding week so favorable as that just past. The cholera is scarce and has considerably abated.

A suit has been begun in the Supreme Court on behalf of Joseph Seligman and others to prevent a mortgage made by the North and South Alabama Railroad Company from being cancelled. It appears that the plaintiffs agreed to dispose of the bonds of the road, receiving a commission of 33-4 per cent. upon the whole amount, but the defendants failed to carry out their part of the agreement, hence the suit.

Thirty of the best and most experienced men on board of the receiving ship were selected for the crew of the Tigress is announced to sail positively Saturday. The Tigress will carry two hundred and fifty tons coal, and if necessary will get a new supply at St. Johns, by this evening all the supplies of provisions will be shipped. They are composed principally of pork and fatty matter, a large quantity of Penniman will be taken. Also canned vegetables and fruits. Total amount of provisions carried will be rations for forty men for two years.

FROM CINCINNATI.

CINCINNATI, July 9.

The Hebrew Conference comprising 15 congregations of the West and South convened here to-day. Moritz Loth, of Cincinnati presiding. The object of the Convention is the establishment of a Hebrew Theological Institution. There were two hundred delegates present, and letters were read from many congregations. Resolutions endorsing Proprietary were passed unanimously.

FROM NEW HAMPSHIRE.

CONCORD, July 9.

An attempt was made last night to throw the Boston express train off the track near Suncook. Two men were seen placing ties upon the track by a woman, whom they beat to insensibility and dragged to concealment among bushes. She recovered consciousness and managed to reach Suncook depot, gave notice of the obstruction and saved the impending destruction of the train and probably many lives. The assailants robbed the woman of her satchel containing nearly \$400. The satchel was found, but in place of money was a piece of paper on which was plainly written, "We made more money than we should if we had tipped off train, you fool." No traces of them could be found.

FOREIGN NEWS.

FROM LONDON.

LONDON, July 9.

In the House of Commons a motion was made that the Government should address foreign Powers with a view to establishing arbitration as a permanent resort for the settlement of differences between nations. The motion was supported by figures showing the cost of standing armies.

Gladstone opposed the motion. He argued that it would defeat its own object, because Continental nations held widely different views on the subject. He asked the government to withdraw his motion.

Mr. Richards declined to withdraw. The house divided, and the division resulted in a tie—yes 98, nays 98. The Speaker gave the casting vote in favor of the motion, which was adopted.

FROM WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, July 9.

FROM IDAHO.

BLACK ROCK, July 9.—Sergeant Indiana awaiting trial for murder, attempted to escape while cutting wood; three escaped and four were killed.

FROM KANSAS.

LAWRENCE, July 9.

A half mile of the Missouri Pacific Railroad track, near Kickapoo Station, dropped into the Missouri river and sank out of sight in the flooded stream without any warning to the railroad men. The water, where the track was situated, is now forty feet deep. Railroad men say it is the most fearful rent ever made. The escape of the trains was almost a miracle.

FROM BALTIMORE.

BALTIMORE, July 9.

Professor Thor Baird, Principal of Baltimore City College, died this morning aged 54.

FROM CHICAGO.

CHICAGO, July 9.

Telegraphic crop reports from numerous points in Illinois and Iowa, covering the greater part of these States, show that while recent severe rain storms have considerably damaged the wheat crop, particularly in locations where it was just ready to harvest, there will be an average crop. Oats have suffered more, being barely lodged, and in many places will have to be mowed. Corn looks well, and with favorable weather, will make an average crop.

FROM NEW YORK.

FROM PARIS.

PARIS, July 9.

The second instalment of 250,000,000 francs of last milliard of the war indemnity, was delivered to the German Treasury on the 5th. There now remains due to France but 500,000,000 francs which in accordance with the treaty signed at Berlin, on the 15th of March last, is to be paid by the 5th of next September.
