use of education in North Carolina. The purpose for which we have come together on this interesting occasion is distinctly announced in two resolutions which were adopted by the State Board of Education on the 16th day of April

That education, next to religion, is or ought to be the highest aspiration of every human being, is a truism which none will deny. That the cause of education is, or pught to be, the chief object of encouragement and promotion is every civilized nation all will admit. How then has it happened that so noble and so beneficent a cause has ceased to occupy the attention or engage the affections of the great mass of the people in our own State ! That the fact is so, we hear from so many sources that we are obliged to recognise it as the truth. Yes, gentlemen, with mortification we must acknowledge that almost, if not quite all the educational in stitutions which are immediately under from Wake county, (two cases.)
