DOMESTIC NEWS.

FROM WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, July 23.

The headquarters of the Department of the Gulf was temporarily removed from Orleans to Holly Springs on the 20th inst.

CHOLERA IN INDIANA.

EVANVILLE, July 23. Nothing new has been developed in the Goss murder case in the last two days, except the finding of a person who shipped the body to Baltimore which was found in the ruins of a burned building. Underdick's mother spent an hour with him this morning. Most of the time was spent in prayer by his mother, who believes her son to be guilty, yet has hopes in his ability to prove his innocence. He is calm and collected. He dresses him self with care and is polite to all callers. Rhodes, his brother-in-law, has not been arrested or reported, nor will he be, as no evidence can be obtained against him.

SPAIN.

MADRID, July 23.

President Sabatino held a council of Generals to-day. He was advised to summon immediately into active service 90,000 reserves. The civil governors Seville and Albacarre have been dismissed and replaced by special delegates. Gen. Martinez has superseded Gen. Valdés, as Capt. General of Valencia. The inhabitants of Ultra have defeated and taken two guns from an insurgent column which marched out of Seville to carry into effect the declaration of independence. As the insurgent invaded Vittoria was sailing from Alcauta, a German frigate, which was lying in the harbor, got up steam and followed her out by orders from the German Legion at Madrid.

BARCELONA, July 23.

The remains of Gen. Cabrerizo, who was killed in the engagement near Ripol between the Republicans and Carlists, will be brought to this city.

There were 876 deaths in Brooklyn yesterday, including 238 under five years of age—a heavy increase in mortality. The health of the city is reported as bad, and investigation in different wards shows cholera morbus, cholera infantum, diarrhea, intermittent fever, and other diseases incidental to bad ventilation and over crowded tenements and lack of care of little ones cause such mortality.

FOREIGN NEWS

FROM CUBA.

HAVANA, July 23.

The Spanish Conservatives of Havana, sent to Madrid by the last mail steamer, a petition to be presented to the Cortes, in which they say so long as a single armed rebel remains, who cries "Death to the Spaniards," and until a sufficient time has elapsed for the complete establishment of tranquility in the Island of Cuba, no reforms shall be introduced, such as are likely to produce disturbances which would only be favorable to the rebels. The petition was signed mostly by the wealthy Spaniards and slave-holders and their dependants. The republican committee assailed to-day for Spain, to lay their cause before the Cortes. They ask for more reforms, especially the liberty of the press, the abolition or modification of the censorship, and the practical abandonment of the republican form of Government here as well as in Spain.

FROM LONDON.

LONDON, July 23. The weather here continues very hot, at 12:30 o'clock this afternoon, the thermometer stood 87 degrees.

A severe thunder storm accompanied by sharp lightning swept over Lancashire yesterday. The crops are damaged in various localities and several persons were struck by lightning and killed.

SPANISH AFFAIRS.

MADRID, July 23. A meeting which was attended by all the members of the cabinet and a large number of the majority of the Cortes was held last evening at the War office to discuss what measures should be adopted to secure the overthrow of the insurrectionary movements in the country, and the restoration of order.

The Cortes has approved the bill providing for the imposition of extraordinary taxes. Persons known to be sympathetic with the Carlists are to be taxed heavier than loyal population. The minority of the Cortes have issued a manifesto condemning the policy of the government.

FROM GEORGIA.

ATLANTA, July 23.

The Herald, imitating its New York namesake, started this day a special train from Atlanta to west Point to carry its daily mail in advance of other city papers 24 hours.

The Board of Fire Underwriters resolved to raise the rate of insurance on all buildings with Mansard roofs, and invites all insurance companies in the country to write with them.

FROM WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, July 23.

Attorney General Williams refused to recommend a pardon in the case of James

Pickett, of Idaho, who is sentenced to be hung in that territory. Pickett dealt a blow with a miner's pick, on the skull of an Indian woman, killing her almost instantly. He was arraigned and tried by the civil authorities of Idaho, and sentenced to death, it being the first case where a white man has been sentenced to suffer the extreme penalty of the law for the murder of a red skin.
