Sunday Night's Dispatches. Domestic News. MISCELLANEOUS. St. Louis, Aug. 17. The first bale of cotton auctioned off here brought 70 cents.

DOMESTIC NEWS. PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 18. Mrs. McKenny in coaxing fire with kerosene oil fatally burned herself and a four year old child.

FROM CHICAGO. CHICAGO, Aug. 18. The blame for the Chicago Alton accident attaches to the engineer and conductor of the coal train, who moved contrary to regulations. They have disappeared.

FROM KENTUCKY. LOUISVILLE, Aug. 18. George Liebrook has been arrested on the charge of being a bogus revenue officer. He evaded several larger beer establishments.

FROM NEW YORK. NEW YORK, Aug. 18. A letter from the Yellowstone Expedition reports much ill feeling between the infantry and cavalry, owing to the arrest of General Custer by General Stanley and compelling him to march one whole day in the rear of his command.

FROM CHICAGO. CHICAGO, Aug. 18. The gold operations in Wall Street Saturday have given rise to a feeling that the gold clique purposes trying again the tactics which led the black Friday, and the bears are preparing to appeal to the President to interfere on this occasion in time to prevent the bulls from succeeding.

FROM WASHINGTON. WASHINGTON, Aug. 18. Two witnesses of the Warramett investigation swear that the engineer was acting as bar keeper a few moments before the flames burst from the rear engine room. It first issued from the steam box. A general court martial has been ordered.

FROM SPAIN. MADRID, Aug. 18. Several persons have been condemned to death by the tribunal of justice at Seville for being bullfighting boys by means of petroleum while that city was occupied by the insurgents. Many other persons, charged with the same crime, escaped to Portugal, but a number have been arrested by the authorities of that country and surrendered to Spanish officials.

FROM NEW YORK. NEW YORK, Aug. 18. A letter from Rome says that the Mayor has posted up a notice prohibiting all persons, under pretext of making pilgrimages, either singly or in groups, from passing through the city. It is regarded as fanaticism not to be encouraged, and as a means used for keeping up political excitement as well as detrimental to public health, allowing great crowds to come together at Assisi or other similar places, with very imperfect means of accommodation, might be attended with a serious harm, as Mussolin pilgrimages to Mecca have served to propagate cholera and other maladies.

FOREIGN NEWS.

FROM LONDON. LONDON, Aug. 18. A Herald correspondent at Cartagena telegraphs that Martinez Campos, is at Bogota City, with six thousand soldiers, two batteries and twelve mortars. The British fleet continues to guard the rebel frigates. The German and British Consuls have left the city.

FROM VIENNA. VIENNA, Aug. 18. The United States gets ten diplomats, England gets thirty.

FROM ONTARIO. SNAPOURTH, Aug. 18. A man passing in the woods near here, heard a child cry. He found its mother and father with their throats cut. No cause.

SPANISH AFFAIRS. MADRID, Aug. 18. There was no truth in the dispatch sent the Carlist Junta at Bayonne. The attack was gallantly repulsed by the Republicans who after a severe contest defeated the insurgents and drove them from before the town.

FROM MISSOURI. ST. LOUIS, Aug. 18. At Granby, Mo., during a circus fight, a prominent merchant was killed and two ladies wounded. A negro who participated in the fight was wounded through the breast. The other two, who were white, escaped.

FATAL ACCIDENTS. LOUISVILLE, Aug. 18. There were three fatal accidents on Sunday on the Louisville and Nashville railroad. A man attempted to jump on a moving train and was killed. Two others were asleep on the track and were killed.

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FROM CHICAGO. CHICAGO, Aug. 18. J. H. Smith and S. W. Henry, victims of the Chicago and Alton Railroad disaster, died this morning.

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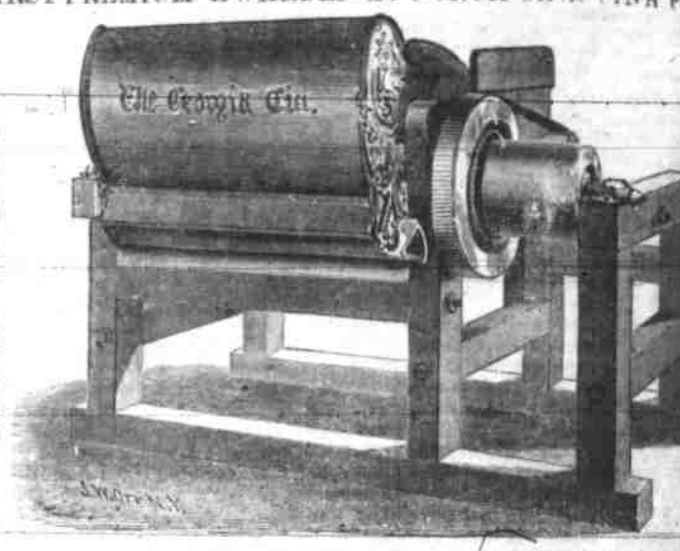
