PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 18. Mrs. McKenney in cooing fire with kerosene oil fatally burned herself and a four year old child.

HON. WM. N. MEREDITH died today aged 77. He was a very prominent lawyer, also Secretary of the Treasury under Taylor, and President of the present and last constitution convention of this State.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18. Capt. Howgate, of the Signal Service, leaves the city to-morrow morning to make a preliminary survey for a telegraph line along the coast of New Jersey from Cape May to Sandy Hook, connecting with the several life saving stations which are to be used for the display of cautionary signals. A similar survey has been made of the Massachusetts coast. The necessary cable and wire for the desired line has already been ordered.

### FROM CHICAGO.

CHICAGO, Aug. 18. The blame for the Chicago Alton accident attaches to the engineer and conductor of the coal train, who moved contrary to regulations. They have disappeared.

### FROM KENTUCKY.

LOUISVILLE, Aug. 18. George Liebrook has been arrested on the charge of being a bogus revenue officer. He mislabeled several larger beer establishments.

### FROM NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, Aug. 18. A letter from the Yellowstone Expedition reports much ill feeling between the infantry and cavalry, owing to the arrest of General Custer by General Stanley and compelling him to march one whole day in the rear of his command. There is no cause assigned.

Charles Smock, of Freehold, New Jersey, lost five valuable horses from Cerebral Spinal Meningitis last week. The disease is reported to be rapidly spreading in the vicinity.

The gold operations in Wall street Saturday have given rise to a feeling that the gold clique purposes trying again the tactics which led the black Friday, and the bears are preparing to appeal to the President to interfere on this occasion in time to prevent the bulls from succeeding.

The National Revenue Reform Association has addressed a communication to the Secretary of the Treasury, asking him to revoke the order recently issued by Collector Arthur of the custom house, requiring merchants in position to make affidavits of the entries; the latter will be a serious harm, as Moslem pilgrimages to Mecca have served to propagate cholera and other maladies.

### FROM SPAIN.

MADRID, Aug. 18. Several persons have been condemned to death by the tribunal of justice at Seville for firing buildings by means of petroleum while that city was occupied by the insurgents. Many other persons, charged with the same crime, escaped to Portugal; but a number have been arrested by the authorities of that country and surrendered to Spanish officers.

The Internationalists in Barcelona discourage the burning of fires by their compatriots, claiming that it is believed that all such property will soon become their own.
