RALEIGH SOME FORTY YEARS

Extracts from a Boy's Journal.

CONCLUMED.

We conclude to-day our extracts from the journal of a mere youth written nearly forty years ago. We are pleased to learn that these extracts have been read by our old citizens with a considerable degree of interest. The journal was of

course not intended for publication and we have used portions of it only by the consent of the relatives of the deceased writer.
