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The Concert on Friday Night.

The concert for the benefit of the Oxford Orphan Asylum, given at Tucker Hall, on Friday night, by the Raleigh Sextette and Quartette Clubs, assisted by Mrs. and Miss Ada Slater and Prof. Grotz, of Hillsboro, and including Dr. L. Von Meyerhoff, of the Raleigh Female Seminary, and Prof. Schneider, of St. Mary's, was a decided success.

The Sextette Club played the overture to "Tigerade" by Rossini; the gallop "Tribulation"; the overture to "Norma" by Bellini; and the Waltz "On the Banks of the Blue Danube." The gallop was deservedly applauded and an encore called for but the club substituted another composition.

The Sextette Club also played in the quartette "Last Rose of Summer," and in the "Anvil Chorus" from "Il Trovatore"—the latter enthusiastically encored. The Sextette Club established their reputation in this concert and they had the pleasure of discovering that their talents are appreciated and that they are now Raleigh favorites.

Mrs. and Miss Ada Slater were well received and acquitted themselves very handsomely. Their duet, "Cheerfulness," met with a hearty encore, as did also the soprano solo of Miss Slater, "Killing Waltz." This was the young lady's debut, and to say the least of her she went through the ordeal creditably.

Dr. L. Von Meyerhoff came to Raleigh with a high reputation as a pianist and he fully sustained it on Friday night. The universal opinion of those who heard him is that he is equal to the best pianists in America. His power over the instrument is extraordinary.

His "American Medley," which included, indeed, the airs of all nations, exhibited much of his power and was rewarded by an encore, enabling the performer to introduce an arrangement of his own as a substitute. The grand duo for the piano and organ by Schumann, played by Dr. Von Meyerhoff and Prof. Grotz, was a splendid performance, marred, however, by an indifferent organ. But one of the gems of the evening was the piano duet, "Euryanthe," by Ravina, played by Dr. Von Meyerhoff and Prof. Schneider.

Prof. S. is a pianist of rare excellence and the rendering of this fine composition by two such artists may be imagined better than it can be described.

The piano solo, "Miserere del Trovatore," by Verdi, rendered with warmth and exquisite taste by Prof. Grotz, was heartily applauded.

It is rare, indeed, that three such pianists and musicians as Von Meyerhoff, Schneider and Grotz can be heard in a single concert, and the audience showed its appreciation of the fact.

Messrs. Royser, Simpson, Busbee and Doerp deserve special mention. Royser is a musical genius. He can play almost any instrument and always plays carefully and well. Simpson is one of the best amateur fute players in the State and never attempts anything without succeeding in it. Busbee is a young member but gives promise of becoming one of the most efficient. Dr. Doerp is always ready to supply deficiencies in the absence of an instrument.

His best performance on Friday night was in the role of the blacksmith in Verdi's "Anvil Chorus."

Messrs. Bryson, Brooks, Jordan and Balchaber, the vocal quartette, rendered efficient aid and brought down the house in the choruses "Last Rose of Summer" and the "Anvil Chorus."

Taken all together this was one of the most delightful concerts we ever heard in Raleigh, and its reputation is demanded by our citizens. Had the weather been good the Hall would have been crowded. Dr. Doerp, as manager, was considerable reputation with the clubs.
