On motion of Mr. McGee, the resolution introduced by himself on yesterday concerning "back pay" of members of Congress was read and made special order for to-morrow at 19 M.

Mr. Brown, of Davidson, offered a substitute that the provisions of the bill should apply to the sheriff of the counties of Surry and New Hanover, and requiring them to pay into the treasury three-fourths of the taxes due from their respective counties, withdrawn by consent.

Mr. Brown, of Mecklenburg, offered an amendment. Provided that said sheriff and tax collectors pay in and settle three-fourths of the said taxes as now required by law.

Mr. Waugh moved to strike out three-fourths and insert one-half. Lost.

Mr. Rhodes moved to indefinitely postpone the whole matter—and demanded the yeas and nays. The motion to postpone did not prevail.

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Legislative Summary.

In the Senate yesterday an important bill was introduced by Mr. Norwood, proposing to prevent fraud in the sale of commercial manure.

Mr. Morehead, of Guilford, also introduced an important bill—supplemental to and explanatory of all acts of incorporation passed by the present Legislature.

Mr. Todd introduced a bill to make slander a misdemeanor punishable by fine and imprisonment.

Mr. Dunham introduced a resolution on the "Cuban Massacre" which will be found in our Senate report.

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A "Hofly" Contract.

Our Governor has the following bill of indictment against ignorance in his latest message:

"Without education there is no enlightenment. Ignorance blights the mind and dwarfs the intellect; it debases all the noble instincts and degrades man to the level of a brute; it demolishes churches and rears god shops upon their ruins; it destroys schools and seminaries and erects gambling saloons and dens of infamy and pollution in their stead; it unfits man to fulfill the high destiny for which he was created and makes him a drone and often an oncast in society."

In the same message we read: "I am free to say that these unlettered (i. e. "ignorant" jurors, for he means that) as often arrive at correct conclusions as do those who have had better educations and enjoyed superior advantages."

It is this not a plea for "ignorance," which above he so bitterly denounces, what is it? If our Governor cannot do better than this in a grave State paper, we will be forced to return to our old name or dub him afresh.
