Some Northern chap who, we dare say, had never read any of the immortal works of George Eliot, being commendably desirous of saying something handsome on our highly endowed North Carolina lady novelist, was pleased to pronounce her the "George Eliot of America." For our part we gladly accept the compliment but reject the implied criticism. Any one must indeed have "optics keen" who can trace any great resemblance between "Middlemarch," "Adam Bede," "Mill on the Floss" and "Romola"—the greatest and most wonderful works of George Eliot—and "Carmen's Inheritance," the promising and clever production of Miss Fisher. The absurdity of the comparison lies in the remoteness of resemblance in the two writers. It is true they both write fiction in good English, but surely they are very unlike. Tenyson and Browning are men of the genius, and both write poetry, but what sane critic would compare them? What a ridiculous thing it would be to say that Edgar A. Poe was the Milton or Walter Scott, of America, although Poe wrote capital poems and wonderful stories. The compliment would be great, but the comparison would only provoke laughter or contempt among those who were familiar with the writings of those nobly gifted authors. Miss Fisher, we repeat, is a young lady of superior talents, and we are prepared to read some work from her pen that will secure for her a high place among the famous novelists of the world. She is young, and when her powers are fully matured, she can sit down to her work ready to labor with patient care, she will write some book that perhaps "future ages will not willingly let die." A recent English letter writer writing to George Eliot, says: "On her manuscript she toils tremendously, making on an average six hours a day, and rarely accomplishing in that time more than three hundred or four hundred words." Hence, her works exhibit the highest literary perfection, and her words are so aptly chosen that they fit each other like stones in a mosaic.

### NOT SETTLED.

If we may credit certain mysterious utterances of the Washington Republican (Grant's semi-official organ) the settlement of our difficulties with Spain is not assured. Demanding justice, and seeking honorable reparation for the wrongs that have been inflicted upon the country, Secretary Fish, in the conduct of the case, has, at all times, been embarrassed by the peculiar and unfortunate circumstances which attend the administration of affairs in Spain by the Castelar Government."

From New York comes the rumor that the Spaniards there do not think the Cubans will abide by the terms made by the Castelar Government. We do not believe that Congress will take any action that will bring war upon the country. We believe that peace will not be broken despite the oracular utterances of papers, or the fears of Government officials. Spain has everything to lose in a contest with the United States and will avoid war if possible.
