The case before them was a preliminary one, to-wit whether the Treasurer of the State of North Carolina should be injoined from paying out may funds until the interest fund is repaid. The Court refused to grant the injunction, but west beyond this, and decided a question that was not before them, but which will come to a hearing in January next. It decided that the Special Tax Bonds are constitutional and that the act of the Legislature of 1870-71, directing a division of the funds collected for payment of the interest accruing on them, was unconstitutional. lo other words, they give an opinion (extra-Judicial) because not before them, but which is to be tried hereafter. They prejudge without hearing the evidence, the

The effects of their decision will be extremely afflictive to our people. If the special taxes are to be levied hereafter to psy the interest on the fraudulent bonds issued under the Holden-Littlefield re gime, then the most appalling concequences will follow. We find the case so well stated in the Wilmington Journal of the 3d inst., that we lay the most pregnant passages before our readers. Referring to the fraudulent bonds of 1868-'69, the Journal says:

If the sets authorizing these bonds are valid laws of North Carolina there is no need for the Federal Court to apply any coercion or compulsion to the present or any future Legislature, for no further legislation is necessary.
