Mr. Welch, obtained a suspension of the rules to put upon its passage a resolution in favor of Judge Henry.

Mr. Gudger and Col. Welch, stated positively that he had received no compensation whatever.

An act to amend the charter of the town of Concord, in Cabarrus county, passed its several readings.

A bill for the better protection of the bridges in Granville and Pitt county.

On motion of Mr. Gudger was recommended.

Resolution in favor of the National Bank at Fayetteville, to refund money and interest improperly collected in the way of taxes.

Mr. Seymour moved to strike out the interest, resolution was adopted, passed its several readings.

An act to extend the time of collecting the railroad tax in Forsyth county, passed its several readings.

A bill to incorporate Mount Morenci on Hominy Creek, in Buncombe county, passed its several readings.

A bill to incorporate the town of Whiteville, in Columbus county, passed its several readings.

An act to authorize the late sheriff Wright, of Edgecombe county, laid on the table.

An act to authorize the Danville and Coalfield railroad, to purchase the Atlantic Tennessee & Ohio railroad, authorizes the issue of mortgage bonds at the rate of twenty thousand dollars per mile, passed its several readings.

A bill to incorporate the Diamond Cotton Chopper and Cultivator Company. Passed its several readings.

An act to change the time of the meeting of the county commissioners of Carteret county. Passed its several readings.

An act to amend the fence law so far as it applies to Caswell Neck, Northampton county. Passed its several readings.

A bill to restore the burst records of Watauga county. Passed its several readings.

A bill to establish a toll bridge on the French Broad river in Buncombe county, near A. N. Alexander's. Passed its several readings.

Mr. Welch again advocated the amendment.

On motion of Mr. Humphrey, the Senate adjourned.

A bill to incorporate Grey's Chapel of the Methodist Protestant Church in the county of Randolph. Passed.

A bill to incorporate Clayton Lodge, No. 68, of Odd Fellows in the county of Johnston. Passed.

A bill to incorporate the town of Bethel in the county of Pitt. Passed.

A bill to prevent distemper and other infectious diseases among cattle at the request of Dr. C. Tate Murphy. Col. Welch and Dr. Love rose and explained unsatisfactorily. Capt. Todd came to the rescue, throwing much light on the subject. The bill passed its several readings.

An act to extend the time of the tax collector in McDowell county to settle with the county Treasurer. Passed its several readings with amendment by insertion of the name of the sheriffs of Yancey county.

A bill to incorporate the town of Tipton in Wilson county, passed several readings.

A bill to amend the charter of the town of Newbern. On motion of Mr. Seymour postponed until Wednesday night.

A bill to incorporate the town of Jonesboro' in the county of Moore, passed third reading.

A bill to incorporate Blue Ridge, No. 257, Free and Accepted Masons, in Moore county, passed several readings.

A bill to incorporate the Warehouse and Trust Company of the City of Raleigh. On motion of Mr. Love recommended to committee for want of Treasurers receipt for tax of \$35.

A bill to incorporate the town of Jonesville in Yackin county, passed several readings.

On motion of Mr. Cramer the Senate adjourned at 10 p. m.

Mr. Ellis, a bill to enlarge the Insane Asylums and for the better government of the same.

This provision failed, and it will astonish the natives. What can Billy or Buford or the President, who ever may be, want with more than \$700,000 unless it is

to speculate on. This was a salutary provocation and in these thievish times should

have been adopted. An honest President

of the corporation would not object to it,

and we hope it will yet be adopted. Governor Morehead did not object to such restrictions

on him, when he was President of the North Carolina Railroad. What a wholesome check this would have been upon Littlefield, Swepson, Andrew Jones and Dr. Sloan, when special Josie ran so high.

Another amendment Mr. Troy offered, which was voted down, that the bonds should run ten years. The bonds

should be thirty year bonds, and this

time should be named in the bill. No bill omitting the time or term of its bonds

was ever passed except by a Radical Legislature.

Andrew Jones in his mortgage

made thirty year bonds, and inserted a

clause that if the interest was not paid by

a specified time the principal should be due

with the unpaid interest. A suit is now

going on in the Federal Court to appoint

a receiver for the road. The Wilmington, Charlotte, & Rutherford road was

sold out under a similar clause contained

in the mortgage. Leave such gaps down

and Stock Watering Buford and bride

offering, bride taking, woman voting

Billy, will have the road sold out long before Gov. Caldwell can catch Littlefield.

After Treasurer Dave's sale of the mort-

gage bonds of the North Carolina road at 6 cents to Swepson when they were

worth 10, we doubt if he should be al-

lowed to sell them.
