## Senate.

WEDNESDAY, Jan. 14, 1874.

Senate met at 11 o'clock, Lieut. Gov.  
Brodens in the chair.

The journal of yesterday was read and  
approved.

TO THE HOUSE.

Mabson, col. memorial from the citizens  
of New Hanover, remonstrating against  
the erection of a new county out  
of a portion of said county. Placed on  
calendar with the bill.

Mr. Norwood, bill to prohibit the sale  
of spirituous liquors, powering against the  
same. Passed 25-12.

A similar protest was presented and  
disposed of in the same way.

By Mr. Ellis, of Columbus, bill to amend  
an act giving cities and towns  
jurisdiction of justices of the peace. Referred.

By Mr. Norwood, bill to authorize the  
employment of convict labor by the N.C.  
Agricultural Society. Referred to Committee on Penitentiary.

By Mr. Troy, of Cumberland, bill and  
petition to forbid the sale of spirituous  
liquors in certain localities. Referred.

By Mr. Troy, bill to incorporate Fly-  
etteridge Lodge 329. Referred to Committee on Corporations.

By Mr. Troy, a bill to incorporate Per-  
severance Lodge 74. Friends of Temper-  
ance. Referred to committee on corporations.

By Mr. Ramsour, a bill to incorporate Leola  
Lodge 72, L. O. F. Tyrrell county.  
Referred to committee on corporations.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

On motion of Mr. Scott, leave of ab-  
sence was granted to Mr. McCauley and  
Mr. Ellison, of Catawba for Saturday and  
Friday.

On motion of Mr. Gudger, indefinite  
leave of absence was granted to Mr.  
Cowles on account of sickness.

## SPECIAL ORDER

At 11:30 o'clock the bill to lay off and  
establish the new county of Lillington was  
taken up as the special order for that  
hour on its third reading.

Mabson, colored, offered an amendment  
providing that the bill should not become  
a law until ratified by the qualified voters  
of the proposed new county.

Mr. Murphy presented a memoir to  
the citizens of New Hanover in regard to the  
new County of Lillington.

The amendment of Mabson, colored,  
was discussed by Senators Allen, Mabson,  
col., Seymour, Harris, col., and Murphy.

Mr. Humphrey called the previous question  
on the passage of the bill, which being  
sustained, the vote recurred on the  
amendment of Mabson, colored. The yeas and  
nays were ordered, and the amendment  
was lost—yeas 17, nays 22.

The question occurred upon the pas-  
sage of the bill—yeas 25, nays 19.

The bill passed its last reading.

On motion of Mr. Troy, the rules were  
suspended and the bill was engrossed and  
sent to the House.

## RESOLUTION

By Mr. Waring, a resolution that in fill-  
ing vacancies the Governor has power to  
issue commission to his appointed  
clothing them with the power of judge  
only until the next regular election, and  
that no such office can be filled by ap-  
pointment without the advice and consent  
of the Senate, and that all appointments  
otherwise made, are null and void and of  
no effect. Referred to Judiciary Committee.

At 1 o'clock, the bill incorporating the  
New River Canal Company was put upon  
its second reading.

Certain amendments were offered and  
adopted.

The bill passed its second reading—  
aye 25, nays 0.

Mr. Scott moved that the bill be made  
special order for Monday next.

Mr. Humphrey that the bill in relation  
to interest be made the special order for  
Tuesday at 12 o'clock.

Mr. Lowe moved that the Senator from  
Brunswick be allowed leave of absence for  
the present week.

On motion of the same, the Senate ad-  
journed.

Mr. Jones of Orange, a bill in relation  
to persons in jail working the public  
roads.

Mr. Lutterloh, a bill to amend section  
24, chapter 69, Battle's Revision.

Mr. Gidney, a bill to authorize the  
Chairman of the Board of County Com-  
missioners of Cleveland county to make  
title to certain town lots.

Mr. Richardson, a bill to prohibit the  
sale of intoxicating liquors within three  
miles of the M. E. Church at Abbotts-  
burg, Bladen county.

Mr. Brown, of Davidson, a bill to en-  
power the Board of Education for David-  
son county to establish a teachers insti-  
tute in said county.

Mr. Cox, a bill to prescribe the duties  
of the clerks of the Superior Courts and  
Justice of the Peace in relation to bills of  
cost.

For good and sufficient reasons leaves  
of absence were granted to Messrs. Lind-  
say, Perry of Wake, Darden, Mizell and  
Jones of Camden.

The bill to authorize the commissioners  
of Polk county to levy a special tax, passed  
its third reading and was ordered to be  
engrossed and sent to the Senate.

Senate bill to amend the charter of the  
State of the Carolinas at Charlotte was  
amended and passed its several readings.
