The greenback inflationists have met with a defeat in Congress. Mr. Randall moved to adopt a resolution to the effect that if any increase of currency should be ordered by Congress, it should be in legal tender notes. This was voted down by a vote of 69 to 65. It is thought that this vote was significant of the feeling of Congress in regard to inflation.

Gen Grant is surely very unfortunate in his appointments. He nominated T. B. Searles as Surveyor-General of Colorado, and now a delegation of republicans in Washington opposing the appointment. They accuse him of having been a life-long democrat of the strictest school, one who counselled resistance to the draft during the war, rejoiced at the death of Lincoln, opposed the Fourteenth and Fifteenth amendments to the Constitution, and never swerved from his political faith until he was bought off during the Hannan-Buckley contest of 1873.

It is now known that the New York City ring under the splendid leadership of the dashing and mighty Tweed, did actually appropriate the exceedingly neat little sum of twenty millions of dollars. Tweed is a full rival—possibly more than a rival of certain light-fingered gentry who ran certain States in the South for awhile. We copy the following relative to the preparations for autopsy in the case of the respondent of the New York Tribune:

The bodies are to be examined, casts made, and photographs taken, the whole result to be reported to the colleges as soon as practicable. Gross, of Jefferson College, introduced Dr. Hollingsworth, family physician of the twins, who read a letter from the legal adviser of the families laying great stress on the agreement of Dr. Hancock not to mutilate or dissect the bodies, or cut the connecting band in front, and to embalm the corpses. These agreements, which were read at a meeting, evidently contemplate an exhibition of the bodies, as may be seen from the careful stipulation not to impair their value as scientific subjects. The dissection will probably not be made for several days.

The Grangers have achieved a great victory. They delivered battle for the first time in the House of Representatives on the 10th inst., and gained the day. The Republican party, almost to a man, rallied under the Grangers banner, and passed a resolution asserting, in positive language, the constitutional power of Congress to regulate railroads running from one State to another. The resolution was offered by Mr. Smith, of Ohio, and was professed by a preamble reciting the provision of the Constitution empowering Congress to regulate commerce between the States, and stating that this provision imposed powers and duties of high importance to the citizens of the several States. The resolution then asserted, as the judgment of the House, that Congress has the constitutional power to regulate commerce between the States as to protect the people against all unjust or oppressive tolls, taxation, or obstructions, whether by railroad companies or other carriers, and that the present condition and magnitude of this commerce demand the prompt and wise exercise of this power. The Democrats did not like to be forced to go upon the record on so important a proposition as this without any previous notice. To gain time to consider they introduced a motion to adjourn. When this had been put and lost and the roll was called on Mr. Smith's resolution, there had been a hearty consultation among those who with very few exceptions, the whole body voted in the affirmative. The vote on adopting the resolution was 170 to 64.

NASH COURT. Nash was formed in 1777 from Edgemoor and called in honor of General Francis Nash, of Orange, who fell at Germantown.
