FROM NEW YORK

A DENIAL—MAYOR DENIES CHARGE

New York.—Mr. Archibald, British Consul General here, denies being the authority for the statements in placards published in the agricultural districts of England, that forty thousand hands are waiting to return to England. He pronounces the whole thing as far as relates to him a ridiculous absurd.

The Victory, from New Haven for New York, went on shore at Harts Island, Captain Cook was drowned.

A dispatch from Thomasville announces that three negroes were hung for murdering a planter; one for poisoning his wife. A fourth was threatened by negroes from the jail yard.

After the execution the Sheriff admitted the public, mostly colored, to view the bodies before taken from the gallows.

FROM LONDON.

AN EMIGRANT VANDAL.

London.—Placards are posted up in agricultural districts of England containing statements to the effect that the United States, as stated on the authority of the Consul Archibald, of New York, that 40,000 hands are ready to return to England.

The ship Aurora, from Pensacola for Liverpool, was abandoned on April 8th. The captain and part of the crew were rescued and landed at Dartmouth.

MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS.

CINCINNATI.—The City Council repealed Sunday liquor law by a vote of 28 to 5.

NEW ORLEANS.—The River has fallen a foot. Other crovanes are reported. Above four and a half inches of rain fell within 24 hours ending six o'clock last night.

MEMPHIS.—The heavy rains the past few days have not only been destructive to the planting interest, but with the floods in the various rivers, damaging the different railroads centering here.

LONDON.—Dr. Livingstone is buried. The cochen of the Queen and Prince of Wales were present.

WASHINGTON.—The House passed the bill supplying rations and disused army clothing to the people made destitute by the overflow in lower Mississippi.

"DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE,

Washington, April 18.

To Frederick Kraem, Mayor of Little Rock, Ark.

You must be aware that the President cannot interfere in the domestic difficulties of a State except in conformity with the constitution and laws of the United States. He cannot recognize a call made upon him for military aid by the Mayor of a city.

He has instructed the officers commanding the United States troops at Little Rock to prevent bloodshed—that is all he can do under existing circumstances. I will ask in answer to your inquiry whether the United States are powerless to protect 20,000 people situated in the citizens of Little Rock, Ark., if the people of Arkansas have not patriotism enough to flow upon to aid and assist the United States in settling peacefully and lawfully, and not bring upon their State the disgrace and ruin of civil war.

LITTLE ROCK, April 13.

To Attorney General Williams, Washington, D. C.

In your dispatch to Gov. Brooks I infer you intend to understand as saying the President cannot recognize him a Governor until his right has been fully and finally recognized by the courts. I understand from your dispatch to Governor Baxter that the President cannot recognize him until his right has been settled by the Supreme Court. The Supreme Court will not be in session until June. Now what are we to do in the meantime? Governor Baxter has issued his proclamation, putting the city under martial law, and armed men patrolling the streets, stopping peaceable and unarmed citizens, and setting the authority of the police. Not only this, but private property is being forcibly seized and appropriated in a like manner. The construction placed on your dispatch by Governor Baxter is that it is a license to make an attack on the Brooks faction with an assurance in so doing the Federal Government will not interfere. You will readily see that the city is sure to become a scene of bloodshed and over a strife in authority are not responsible for, and which they have not the power to settle, and placed where so-called to either one of the persons claiming to be Governor in charge of being the partner of the one appointed. I desire to ask if the Federal Government is powerless to protect the lives and property of twenty thousand
