MADRID.—NEW MINISTERS SWORN IN—ARMED OF ROBBERS—RUM.—THE POPE DOWNS ON MEXICO AND CENTRAL AMERICA.

MADRID, May 14.—The new ministers were sworn into office yesterday. The governors of several provinces had, a number of other high officials have resigned since the change of the Government.

NATIONAL AGRICULTURAL CONGRESS RECOMMENDS LEVERVING THE MISSISSIPPI RIVER.

ATLANTA, Ga., May 14.—The National Agricultural Congress to-day passed resolutions pledging aid to the people of the overflowed region in the Mississippi river. The subject of memorializing Congress to reduce the tax on tobacco twelve cents per pound, and also to levee the Mississippi river to prevent overflow, was referred to an appropriate committee.

LARGE ARRIVAL OF MENOMONIES.
BALTIMORE, May 14.—Among the passengers of the steamship Hermosa, of the Bremen line, which arrived at this port on yesterday were one hundred and eighty-five Menomonies from the vicinity of Odessa, Southern Russia. They propose to settle in Dakota or Nebraska.

PROMPT ARRIVAL OF ARKANSAS.

THE LEGISLATURE CALLS ON THE GOVERNOR FOR POSSESSION OF THE STATE HOUSE AND OTHER PROPERTY. BAXTER GOVERNOR.—AMEN.

LITTLE ROCK, May 14th.—Both Houses met this morning and adopted the following joint resolution:

WHEREAS, The Legislature of Arkansas has convened, a quorum of each House being present, and whereas the Capital of our State is occupied by armed and contending forces, and whereas, the State House is now in possession of armed troops therefore:

Be it resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Arkansas, That the President of the United States be and he is hereby requested to put this Legislature in possession of the legislative halls, and that the public property or State House square be placed under the supervision and control of this body, the legal custodians thereof whilst in session, and that he make such order for the disposition of said arm and contending forces as will more perfectly protect the State against domestic violence, and insure this body protection; and that a duly certified copy of this resolution be at once transmitted to the President of the United States.

In the House a large number of notices of the introduction of bills were given, among others for the calling of a constitutional convention.

The situation of the two armed forces remains unchanged.

The Senate appointed a committee to act in conjunction with the House committee appointed yesterday to notify Gov. Baxter that the General Assembly was ready to receive any message he might desire to communicate. The Governor's message, it is thought, will be read to both Houses this evening.

Senate.—The Pensions Committee reported unfavorably applications for pensions for the war of 1812. The Committee favors the House Bill giving eight dollars per month to each and no question asked.

The currency Bill passed. It provides for creating a central and diplomatic appropriation bill.

A number of Southern Representatives held a meeting in the room of the House Committee on Agriculture to-day to fix upon some measure for the reimbursement of the cotton tax levied by the government some years since, and subsequently pronounced unconstitutional by the U. S. Supreme Court. The amount of taxes was sixty million dollars. Thirteen Southern States were represented, and the members were generally agreed that some measure of relief should be passed by Congress.

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED BY THE STATE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE DEMOCRATIC-CONSERVATIVE PARTY PLAN OF ORGANIZATION.

RESOLUTIONS.

Resolved, That we deeply sympathize with the people of the West in their want of railroad facilities, and pledge ourselves to use every available means to secure the early completion of their projected lines.

Resolved, That the Republican party having despoiled the State, millions of dollars heretofore appropriated for railroad purposes, is unworthy of confidenc and no experience justifies the conclusion that if this party should be again entrusted with the administration of our internal improvements, its leaders would again prove recreant to the sacred trust, and would divert the public fund to their private purposes.

Resolved, That a wise policy dictates the adoption of such measures as will increase the educational advantages of the different Moral Classes.

Resolved, That we tender to the friends of Free Government our sincere congratulations at the triumph of the great principle of the Constitution as illustrated by the Democratic success in the recent State and local elections.

PLAN OF ORGANIZATION.

The following plan of the Democratic Conservative party was adopted:

1. The Executive Committee for the State shall consist of at present appointed, and shall have all the powers heretofore conferred upon it.

2. The Executive Committee for the Congressional and Judicial Districts shall consist as at present constituted, until regularly changed, and shall have general supervision of the affairs of the party in their respective districts.

3. In each county there shall be an Executive Committee composed of a Central Committee of not less than three members, and of at least one Committee man from each township. This Committee shall, under direction of the County Convention, have entire control of county matters. It shall be their duty to see that all the details of the canvass are properly conducted, that the rolls are attended by competent challengers, that each Conservative casts his ballot, and that no fraud is perpetrated at the election. They are particularly enjoined to take the necessary steps for the efficient organization of townships, and to seek by a wise administration to promote harmony and to inspire confidence.

4. All Executive Committees are properly chosen by the Conventions held for the respective territorial divisions; but if for any cause there should be a failure by the proper Convention to appoint an Executive Committee, then the State Executive Committee may supply the deficiency.

PLAN OF ORGANIZATION OF THE DEMOCRATIC CONSERVATIVE PARTY.—At a meeting held in this city yesterday, the following plan of organization was adopted by the State Executive Committee:

1. The Executive Committee for the State shall consist of at present appointed and shall have all the powers heretofore conferred upon it.
