RECOLLECT. In reference to the BOLLE'S HANDED COTTON HOE.

At the Convention of the Radical party of the First Congressional District and Second Senatorial District held in Plymouth on Thursday, C. L. Cobb was nominated for Congress, S. T. Carrow and A. A. Crookston for the Senate.

THE CIVIL RIGHTS BILL PASSED BY THE SENATE AS A PARTY MEASURE. From eleven A. M. on Friday till night, and then through all the night till seven o'clock yesterday morning, the Senate had what may be called a stake on the Civil Rights bill—the republicans having retained it.

The colored balance of power in the popular vote of the South and of the Union demanded this Civil Rights bill, and the republicans party in Congress were compelled to meet the requisition.

The bill passed 29 to 18—a partisan division, excepting three republicans in the negative, Boreman of West Virginia, Lewis of Virginia, and Carpenter of Wisconsin, who, on this Civil Rights question, are on the Louisiana controversy, has taken his own course, regardless of party caucus or party necessities.

The account of G. S. Jinks, Superintendent of the Poor House, shows that the amount appropriated during the year was \$3,999.70 for the support of outside paupers.

The account of Timothy F. Lee, sheriff shows that there is due the county from this office on the tax list of 1873, \$2,488.97; from the list of 1874, (\$2,544.70), for county taxes, \$39,544.70; common school fund, \$1,316.59, making a grand total of \$43,350.96.

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THE FINANCIAL STATE OF WAKE COUNTY. Captain W. W. White Register of deeds and ex-officio clerk of the Board of Wake County Commissioners has by their order published a circular setting forth the financial state of the county.

THE ACCOUNT OF THE COUNTY TREASURER. W. M. Brown, shows that he received for the year 1873-74, the sum of \$44,789.35, of which amount \$1,075.00, which is credited to the Sheriff, and which the Treasurer alleges to have been, as now in suit, the Treasurer being the plaintiff and the Sheriff the defendant.
