PARTISAN JUDGES. We publish below a most instructive card from Mr. Fuller, the Conservative candidate for Judge of the Fifth Judicial District in opposition to Judge Buxton, which thoroughly unmasks the position taken by radical candidates for judgeships. The Wilmington "Journal" is glad to learn that the campaign in Mr. Fuller's district is progressing most favorably.

AGARD TO THE PEOPLE OF THE FIFTH JUDICIAL DISTRICT. In the "Spirit of the South" of the 30th inst., I find a card addressed by Judge Buxton "to the people of the Fifth Judicial District." If I regarded this as anything more than an electioneering trick, I would keep silent and let it pass for what it is worth. But as it is only another way of doing what Judge Buxton condemns in his card, and is evidently the strongest appeal which he can make to the people, in uncovering his main position, I ask permission to reply to it in the most effective way. Three points are most to be made, which I will notice in their order.

1. Judge Buxton will not "take the stump and canvass for Judge." I have made no stump speeches, probably I shall not do so, unless matters assume a different shape from that in which I find them now. But a small half hour, before any audience in the District, would be all that any one would require to strip Judge Buxton of his thin covering, and show him to be the candidate of the Republican party—sure of the vote of his own party friends, and endeavoring to divide the conservative party by an appeal to their sense of propriety, and their abhorrence of partisan judges. We thoroughly understand the position assumed, and Judge Buxton would have done better to leave his views to be explained by his friends, if he really desired to keep himself free of party politics.

2. "The people do not want partisan judges, for they are public enemies." This statement is true, and is heartily repeated. We never had partisan Judges in North Carolina until we had Republican Judges. And there is not a Conservative lawyer in the State of any reputation, who is capable of becoming a partisan Judge, in the way in which doubtless Judge Buxton intended the word to be understood. A partisan Judge is one who would persecute justice to subservient party; who would mete out the penalties of the law with favor or vindictiveness, according to the party affiliations of the Judge and culprit; or who would in any way, because of party, make a difference between those upon whose rights he has to pass.

But a party man need not administer his office in any party sense. He would derive and receive the hearty assent of all good men. It would be a gratification to suppose that any one at all desirous of the position could descend to such mean and base measures. Therefore, I take it that Judge Buxton did not act in the remotest degree intend to imply that as
