HONOBARY DEGREES AT DAVIDSON COLLEGE .- The Southern Home says : The Ouratores Venerabilissimi, (as the Latin speaker termed them much to the disguat of certain widowers) confered the Degree of D. D. at the last Commence ment at Davidson College on Rev. William Flinn, of New Orleans, and Rev, R.

L. Breck President of the Central University of Kentucky. Mr. Flinn is the first gradaate of Davidson College ever thus honored. He is a native of North Carelinian, was a metaber of the first class at the College and was graduated under the Presidency of Rev. Dr. Morrison. We hope that the day is not distant when the Gollege may number in its Faculty some of its own alumni. And we trust that the Professors so elected will be lay-

men and not clergymen. The College is not a Theological Seminary, though the clerical names of its Faculty would give that impression. We were at Lexington, Virginia, when

the Superintendent of the Military Institute opposed , vehemently the election of an Alumnus, though that Alumnus was no less a man than R. E. Rodes, afterwards a distinguished Confederate Major General. The Superintendent contended that no first class institution had ever elected an alumnus in a less time than a quarter of a century after it had come ato existence.
