THE COMET.

VIEWS (F TWO CHICAGO PROFESSORS OF ASTRONOMY.

A reporter of the Chicagy Tribune on Sunday last visited Professor Safford, of the Chicago Observatory, and Professor Delafontaine with the view of obtaining

the subject of the comet. Professor Safcourse nearly on a line between the sun and the earth. He replied that a conjunction was not likely. He also expressed the opinion that the comet's tail at that time will by about 5,000,000 miles long at the outside, which estimate would

end of the tail about 21,000,000, supposing the earth and the comet to be directin line. Coggia's comet he said, is smaller than those of 1858 and 1861, with ess tail than either. The only result of contact between the tail and the earth would be, he thought, a greater number of shooting stars than usual. Professor Delafontaine, on being questioned, said he had arrived at some conclusions, through his recent spectroscopic observa-

tions. He had no doubt that the comet is composed of incandescent gas under a ressure less than that of the earth's surace. "The spectrum," he said, "is not a continuous one, made of the seven primary colors, as it would be if the comet vere a solid, a liquid, or a highly compressed gas in an incandesecent state. In other words, the fact that the spectrum a discontinuous one, made of several bright bands separated by dark spaces proves that the nucleus of the comet is an noandescent, rarefied gas."
