EDITORIAL COMPLIMENTS.

The Baltimore "Gazette" goes for the New York "Herald" after the following style:

"The New York 'Herald' prides itself upon being a newspaper; in fact, it is not that it is nothing. To be a newspaper is no claim. It does not give you the news earlier, fuller, and with more accuracy than its contemporaries. New York is no place for it. It had better remove to some little town out West, or turn itself into a sporting sheet. It is strange, then, that the 'Herald' should send to Africa to find Livingston, and yet not have until July 6th an account of the McDonald-Ains affair, and then one which utterly misrepresents the plain facts of the case—facts which the 'Herald's' exchanges, say, the 'Herald's' New York contemporaries, set before its eyes ago. Probably a little more extensive news would not hurt the 'Herald'."

Little or nothing is said about the State debt. Little or nothing is said about a more stringent law against usury. Now is the time and this the season for discussing these questions before the people.

When the Legislature assembles these questions will be discussed. Let the people look to it now, and call out their candidates on these two questions. The only remedy for the hard times or panic as it has been called is more work and a reduced rate of interest. This panic will endure and increase when money is loaned at 12 1/2, 15, and even 20 per cent. A poor country paying such interest must always be in a panic.

THE EFFORT is being made to prejudice the black race against Judge Kerr and other candidates whom Holden had arrested, by pretending that they were Kukulx. If Judge Kerr or any Conservative candidate belonged to the Kukulx, there has been time sufficient to show it. No effort on the part of Holden and Kirk was left untried. The arm of the civil law was not powerless, and Holden even invoked the aid of Kirk's sword. The New York Times has a vile article upon Judge Kerr as a Kukulx, guilty of crime. We should like to have the punishment of such villains.

Article 9, section 17, of the Constitution of North Carolina, reads as follows: "The General Assembly is hereby empowered to enact that every child of sufficient mental and physical ability shall attend the public schools during the period between the ages of six and eighteen years, for a term of not less than sixteen months, unless educated by other means."

Has it ever occurred to the white people of North Carolina, those who have children to educate more especially, that the above section is a part of the fundamental law of their State, and cannot be altered by ordinary legislation? Do they know that the adoption of this part of their constitution, which was in 1869, no such power rested in the hands of the Legislature, but that every father had it in his own power to manage and control the education of his own child at all times, while the schools of the country were in session? Such is not the case with the poorer class of our white people now, and these questions are well worth the attention of every white citizen in the State of North Carolina during the present campaign, particularly that class who have heretofore failed to attend the polls on the day of election, or who have from some personal pique refused to sustain the nominees of the Conservative party. The Legislature now has it in its power to compel mixed schools, a compelling of the poor white children and negro children in the same school and class in the language of this section they have the power to compel all children to attend the public schools who "can not be educated by other means." It matters not. Low rich some may now be, the wheel of fortune varies in its revolution, and at some time the richest as well as the poorest, may be subjected to the operations of this provision. What guarantee have the people of the State that it will not be enforced at the next session of their General Assembly, if the Radical party should succeed in getting possession of that body? Already we are told that 75 per cent of the nominees of that party are negroes, and that all of them are pledged to the success of such an iniquitous measure. They announce this in their platform of 1873, and after reading the Sumner Civil Rights bill, and the emanations of their leading men in and out of Congress, and in our own State Legislature, we can but conclude that the main efforts of that party, since its advent into this State, have been to force upon the white people social negro equality. During the present campaign each and all of their candidates will be prompt in denying and denouncing this their intention, but to an observing mind such denial and denunciation can avail but little. The negroes have drawn the white and black lines from the advent of radicalism in this State. No man has been permitted to secure their suffrage who has not fully committed himself to this policy. Their white advocates will deny it, but no instance can be shown where they have failed rigidly to support the behests of their party. This is now the will of the dominant party North; the decree has gone forth and today the white people of the South are called upon to accept the bequest of the dying Sumner.

Men of North Carolina! think for yourselves, are you prepared for the enforcement of the above section? Are you willing that your children should associate and be educated with negroes, by
