At the conclusion of the latter gentleman's remarks the day was converted into pleasure, the lovers of the "light fantastic" repairing to a platform erected for the occasion, and to the strains of the sweet music were driving dull care away in the merry music of the dance, which was being participated in with great glee when our informant took his departure. The occasion was one of the most pleasant nature, and our only regret is that duty forbade our being with it. We are assured that Mr. Adams' hospitality will not soon be forgotten by those who were so fortunate as to be present.
