Sec. 7 No elector shall be entitled to register or vote in any other precinct or township than the one in which he is an actual bone frie resident on the day of election and no certificates of registration schull be given.

see 8 If shall be the duty of the registrars and judges of election to attend at the politing place of the township or precinct with the registration books on the Saturday preceding the election from the hour of 9 o'clock a. m., when and where the said books shall be open for the mspection of the electors of the precinct or township, and any said electors shall be allowed to object to the name of any person appearing in said books. In case of any such objections, the Register shall enter upon his books, opposite the name of the person objected to, the word "challenged," and shall appoint a time and place on or before the election day where he, together with said Judges of election shall hear and decide said objection, grying due notice to the voters so objected to. Provided, that nothing in this section contained shall be construed to prohibit the right of any elector to challenge or object to the same of any person registered or offering to register at any time other than the above specified. If any person challenged or objected to shall be found not duly qualified, as provided in this set, or as provided in the constitution, the Registrar shall eruse his name from the books.

Sec. 11. No registration shall be alowed on the day of election, but if any person shall give satisfactory evidence to the judges of election that he has come of the age of twenty-one years on the day of election, or has for any other reason become entitled to register, he shall be al lowed to register and vote.
