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sum of five hundred dollars to the person aggrieved thereby, to be recovered in an action on the case, with full costs, and shall also, for every such offense, be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not more than one thousand dollars, or shall be imprisoned not more than one year. If the party aggrieved shall not recover more than one penalty; and when the offense is a refusal of burial, the penalty may be recovered by the heirs at law of the person whose body has been refused burial. And provided further, That all persons may elect to sue for the penalty aforesaid or to prosecute under their rights at common law and by State statutes, and having so selected to proceed in the one mode or the other, their right to proceed in the other jurisdiction shall be barred. But this proviso shall not apply to criminal proceedings, either under this act or the criminal law of any State.

Sec. 3. That the district and circuit courts of the United States, shall have jurisdiction of the courts of the several States, cognizance of all crimes and offenses committed and violations of the provisions of this act.

wherever the defendant may be found, without regard to the other party, and the district attorneys, marshals, and deputy marshals, of the United States and commissioners appointed by the circuit and territorial courts of the United States, with powers of arresting and imprisoning or bailing offenders against the laws of the United States, are hereby specially authorized and required to institute proceedings against every person who shall violate the provisions of this act, and cause him to be arrested and imprisoned or bailed, as the case may be, for the trial before such court of the United States or territorial court as by law has cognizance of the offence, except in the respect of the right of action accruing to the person aggrieved, and such district attorneys shall cause such proceedings to be prosecuted to their termination in other cases. Provided, That nothing contained in this section shall be construed to deny or defeat any right of civil action accruing to any person, whether by reason of this act or otherwise.

Sec. 4. That no citizen possessing all other qualifications which are or may be prescribed by law shall be qualified for service as grand or petit juror in any court of the United States, or of any State, on account of race, color or previous condition of servitude, and any officer or other person charged with any duty in the selection or summoning jurors who shall exclude or fail to summon any citizen for the cause aforesaid shall, on conviction thereof, be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and fined not more than \$1,000.

Sec. 5. That all cases arising under the provisions of this act in the courts of the United States shall be reviewable by the Supreme Court of the United States without regard to the sum in controversy, under the same provisions and regulations as are now provided by law for the review of other cases in said court.
