SUPERME COURT DECISIONS .- The Su preme Court at its recent session filed pinions so reference to cases of which the following is a brief synopsis:

William Page vs. North Carolina Reil road Company, from Wake. Bynum J., delivering opinion, Judgment affirmed. Hogs were killed at the warehouse of the defendant, at Morrisville station, being attracted upon the road track by molesses which had dripped upon the track from the defendant's care, and while there were killed at various times; some by the under the cars, by the engine suddenly starting without blowing the whistle or giving any alarm. This unquestionably was negligence in the company, and would have justified the court in instruct ing the jury that if they believed the evidence, they shou'd find for the plaintiff. The court charged that these several acts constituted negligence. In that

there was no error. Rowland va. Thompson, from Robes Settle, J., delivering opinion. Jadgment reversed. The record in this case is confused. It states, however, that "the defendent asked leave of the court to introthe court declined to hear the evidence for the reason, as the court said, that the pleadings were sufficient for him to decide the case upon, and ordered the clerk to enter the following verdict and decree," If it was a trial by jury, his Honor should not have taken the issue of fact from them. And if there was no wave of a trial by jury, his Honor had no right to determine the questions of fact. In either point of view, presented by the record, there appears to be error. Dancy, Hyman & Co., vs. O. Hubbs. from Craven. Judgment affirmed. Rodman J., delivering opinion. A. & B. both were plaintiffs in execution against O, and both executions had been levied by the Sheriff on the same piece of land-The judgment (docketed) on which A's execution issued was older than B's. On he day of sale A directed the Sheriff to stpone the sale of the land. The Sheriff having both executions in his hand, pro coeded to sell under that of B, and paid the fund into Court. No fraud is charged

against A.

There is no express provision made in the VIIth Article of the constitution, not in any other Article, for filling vacancies in the Board of County Commissioners, The first Section of Article VII, provides that in each county there shall be elected biennially, by the qualified voters thereof, five commissioners. A county is a municipal corporation, so described in the constitution, Article VII, and its powers County "Commissioners" as they are styled in the same Article. "The comporate authorities have an inherent right to fill vacancies" in the Board. And there has been appropriate legislation to enable County Commissioners to fill yacancies in their B and. It was first provided, "that any vacancy occurring in the Board of Commissioners of any county shall be filled by the Governor of the State," See laws of special session of 1868, chapter 4, proviso to section 1, page 6. Afterwards the General Assembly, laws of 1876-71, chapter 76, section 1, page 139, repealed so much of the law of 1868 as provided for filling vacancies is the Board of County Commissioners by the Governor, and further provided that va capcies "shall be filled by a majority of said Board." This seems to be the law at this time. In support of the view that this legislation is appropriate and constitutional, I beg leave to refer your Excellency to the case of People of N. C. ez rel. Nichola et al, va. McKee et al., 68 N. C. Reports, page 437. The opinion of the Court seems to refer to this very legislation; at any rate, the principles enunciated sustain it as proper and constitutional My epinion therefore is, that it is not now and will not be when the vacancy occurs, the duty of a Governor to appoint a County Commissioner. And in case the person elected shall retuse to qualify, then it will be the duty of the other members of the Board to qualify, and then, themselves elect some one to fill the vacancy.
