THE EXECUTION OF McHARD.

A soldier named McHard was recently hanged at Fort Gary for murder. Hanging is so common that it attracts little general attention. The execution of one poor, wretched human life on the gallows is but the faint of a stain in the forest, the breaking of a wave on the shore; a matter of no consequence.

But occasionally there are circumstances connected with the public execution of criminals worthy of a passing word, at least. McHard's is one of those exceptional cases.

McHard, as we criminals do, frankly admitted the cause of his downfall. He said it was drunkenness and bad company. There's a valuable lesson to the world. It's worth a thousand denunciations, a warning to men, to fathers and to mothers.

Hanging is, perhaps, the most horrible of all horrors. The sight of a public execution, chills the blood, makes every face turn pale, fills the soul of the most callous with a strange, over-mastering, indelible dread.

But the psychologist would not be pushed to account for the joy that would fill the hearts of many people, if an all-wise Providence would permit them to see those radical politicians who are trying to stir up a war of race, hung as high as Haman.

She thinks she was swindled, and no doubt she was. AN ORDINANCE FOR THE FUNDING OF THE CITY SCRIPT, AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

Whereas, Prudence and economy, as also a due regard for the interests of the creditors of the city and the protection of its future credit, urgently demand that the amount of the funded and present unfunded or script debt, should be accurately ascertained and some plan devised for the liquidation of the same, by a careful examination of the same, by a committee of the Board of Commissioners, and a faithful administration of the city government, and to apply every cent not necessary, to defray those expenses, in payment of the indebtedness of the city; and so far as in the power of the Board, it is their intention to restrict the issue of script to the smallest amount, and in disposition to the same as soon as possible, as to protect from loss the honest employees of the city. Now, therefore,

Sec. 1. Be it Ordained, That there shall be prepared under the supervision of the Mayor and Treasurer, bonds of the City of Raleigh, of the denominations of \$50, \$100, and \$500, bearing interest at the rate of eight per centum per annum, payable semi-annually, and in amounts sufficient to meet the requirements of this ordinance; and such bonds shall be under the seal of the City of Raleigh, signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the Treasurer, and shall be issued as provided for in section three of this ordinance.

Sec. 2. Be it further Ordained, That the bonds authorized by the foregoing section shall be dated on the first day of the month next succeeding their issue, one-fourth of which shall be payable one year after date, one-fourth two years after date, and one-half five years after date; and each and every holder of the script or warrants on the City Treasurer, or of bonds now due, or which may become due, when presented in amounts of \$50 and upwards, shall be entitled to exchange the same for the bonds authorized to be issued by this ordinance; and whenever presented in sums of a less amount than fifty dollars, the holder or holders thereof, shall receive therefor certificates of indebtedness, in such form as may be prescribed, bearing interest as the bonds above provided, dated in the same manner and at the same rate.

Sec. 3. Be it further Ordained, That two well-known citizens and freeholders of the city of Raleigh, whose duty it shall be to witness the Bonds and Certificates of Indebtedness, and to cancel all script, Bonds, or other evidences of indebtedness, which may be presented for exchange; and no Bond or Certificate of Indebtedness shall be legal until so witnessed; and the Treasurer shall keep a book in which shall be recorded the date, number, amount, term, and to whom issued, of such Bond or Certificate of Indebtedness which may be issued by authority of this ordinance.

Sec. 4. Be it further Ordained, That the coupons, or the interest due and accruing on said bonds or certificates of indebtedness, shall be received in payment of city taxes, and other indebtedness to the city, and when presented for that purpose, the said coupons shall be cut off and paid over to the collector of taxes, and in case there are no coupons, such interest shall be credited on the bond or certificate, and the holder thereof shall give a receipt to the Collector as his receipt for the payment of the same.

Sec. 5. Be it further Ordained, That from and after the first day of October, A. D. 1874, no Script or Warrant upon the City Treasurer, shall be received in payment of city taxes, or other indebtedness thereof, unless for the taxes of the year, and in case there are no coupons, such interest shall be set aside a sum sufficient to pay off the bonds that may become due during the year, and that the sum so set aside shall not be used for any other purpose until all the bonds and certificates of indebtedness so due shall have been paid off.

Sec. 6. Be it further Ordained, That the Mayor and Treasurer hereby authorized and empowered to issue bonds for a longer period than three years, upon the application of holders of bonds, all ready issued, or of holders of City Script or Warrants on the City Treasurer, but all bonds so issued shall be under the same rules and regulations as the one, two and three year bonds authorized by this ordinance.

Sec. 7. Be it further Ordained, That the City Treasurer shall, annually, before the taxes are levied, submit a report to the Board of Commissioners, stating the amount of bonds, certificates of indebtedness and interest coming due during said year, and the commissions shall levy and collect a tax sufficient to pay off the same.

the amount necessary to carry out the ordinance, improvement, etc., estimated at thirty-six thousand dollars, which would be paid in installments of \$1,000 per month, with interest at the rate of six per cent per annum.
