The death of a minister of Christ, long

now deploye, was a man entitled to stand be this ground. He was born in the island of Burbedges, on the 19th of Doc., 1795, and was therefore at his death in most thoroughly English. It best retains the well ordered social system, the industry, the refinement, and, by consequence, the prosperity of the mother country. Whatever was associated with Barbadoes ound favor in Dr. Mason's eyes, and he liked men the better, as I had the good fortune to know, if even their ancestors had lived is the island he loved.

In early youth, however, he was brought to this country by his parents, and his education was completed in Philadelphia. ate by the venerable Bishop White in the year 1917, and in the 22nd year of is age. He woo after became regtor of Christ Charc's, Newbern, in this Diocese. and in the year 1890 received priest's orders by the apostollic hands of the Rt. Rev. Richard Channing Moore, in St. Paul's church, Edenton. In this too he was fortunate, for of all the fathers of the American church none were more deeply, more justly, and more universally concred and leved than those two Bish ope, White and Moore, Dr. Muson remained at Newbern some ten years, and during that time was not only a faithful parish priest, but a very autive and selfdearing missionary. The church had then scarcely any footbold in this Diocese, beyond the limits of Newbern, Wilming-

ton and Payetteville. And yet here and there, there were scattered individuals "Who prized her heavenly ways," "Her sweet communion, solomn vows,

"Her hymns of love and praise." To these Dr. Mason rej seed to minister, be rought them out in their see'n ted neighborhoods, and by them, and by gratefully rem inhered. In my annual visitations to Pitt and Braufort countles, especially old men and women, have been accustomed to ask me: "How is Dr. Mason ! he it was who first presched among us the gospel as the church holds it; he it was who led me the kingdom of

God and His righteousness ! In the year 1828 his ceputation and ability and learning had become so high that he was elected President of Geneva, now Hobert College, in the State of New York' for which office he exchanged, in 1885, for that of President of Newark College, in Delaware. In 1840 he became rector of Christ's church, Raisigh, and fulfilled the duties of that charge until the day of his death. Dr. Mason was a man whom it was impossible to know and not to respect. His mind was clear. strong, and luminous; his knowledge was very varied, very extensive, and above all, very accurate. It was this quality which I especially admired in him, and I believe it to have been the resuit of his moral, as well as his intellectual constitution. He loved truth. He abborred falsehood, in any shape, whe'ber of distortion, exaggeration or ambiguity. Whether it were historical fact, theologic oil speculation he had that to say to which wise and learned men could not but do well to listen. His character was marked by great strictness of principles, and yet, at the same time graced by genuine tenderness of feeling. No man abborred anything that was mean, or low, or false, more than he did, so man maintaiged the out o of right and duty more firmly, while, at the mine time, no man cultivated with more care the domestic charities. As a husband and a father, it would be difficult to equal, perhaps to excel him ; and in these relations he met with a correspond og measure of love and veneration. Goethe mys, somewhere in his writings, speaking, I believe, of the did human nature appear to more advan-tage than in the person of an English Country clergyman, surrounded by his family and flick.
