FROM SOUTH AMERICA

PANAMA, Sept. 20. The United States flag-ship Richmond is here. A correspondent of the Star and Herald, writing from Antigua, Guatemala, under date of the 4th inst., reports an earthquake which took place there on the evening before at 8:30 p. m., without any previous warning. A strong earthquake shook the ground violently in the direction from the west to the east. The movement was a series of strong vertical and horizontal impulses combined. This wave, like undulations on the surface, rose and fell at least a foot. This acting along with the above mentioned vertical movement, made it almost impossible to move about without being thrown to the ground. Added to this there were piercing cries of the populace, creaking and creaking of walls, loud sounds...

FREEDMAN'S BANK

Washington, Oct. 5. The commissioners appointed to settle the affairs of the Freedman's Savings and Trust Company, write to a correspondent as follows: It is impossible yet to say when the first dividend will be paid. They have now only forty-five thousand dollars in the Treasury, and six hundred thousand dollars are required as the basis of a dividend of twenty per cent. In the present condition of the money market, on account of high rate taxation in the District of Columbia, the collections are slow and very small, so it will take a long time to raise sufficient funds to make such dividend. The approximate liabilities up to the 11th of July, were two millions and eight hundred thousand dollars, and the assets were \$2,700,000. While much will be lost in collections, a considerable sum will be realized in the accumulated interest. As a matter of economy, it has been determined to close the thirty-three branches at the end of this month, by which a saving of at least one hundred thousand dollars will be effected.

THE DEBT OF THE CITY OF RALEIGH

To the Holders of Bonds and Script of the City of Raleigh

City of Raleigh: Anxious to do something for the relief of the creditors of the city, and to shape the debt that the interest will be promptly paid for, the Board of Commissioners have had the subject under consideration, and have enacted the following ordinance as the result of their labors. Every tax payer is interested in the financial welfare of the city as much as the Commissioners, and every one should give their hearty cooperation in any measure calculated to relieve the city from its present embarrassments, and place it upon a safe financial basis. We therefore appeal to our citizens who hold city script and overdue bonds, to come forward and exchange the same for the new bonds authorized by this ordinance. Without the aid of the creditors of the city nothing can be done, but with their assistance the city can be so arranged that, with judicious management in the future, the interest can be promptly paid every six months, and the bonds met as maturity.

AN ORDINANCE FOR THE FUNDING OF THE CITY DEBT

Whereas, Prudence and economy, as also a due regard for the interest of the creditors of the city and the protection of its future credit, urgently demand that the amount of the funded and present unfunded or script debt, should be accurately ascertained, and some plan devised for the ultimate payment of the same: And Whereas, It is the desire and intention of the Board, by a rigid system of economy, to reduce expenses to the smallest practicable amount, consonant with a safe and faithful administration of the city government, and to apply every cent not necessary, to defray those expenses, in payment of the indebtedness of the city; and so far as in the power of the Board, it is its intention to restrict the issue of script to the smallest amount, and to discontinue the same as soon as possible so as to protect from loss the honest employees of the city. Now, therefore, Sec. 1. Be it Ordained, That there shall be prepared under the supervision of the Mayor and Treasurer, bonds of the City of Raleigh, of the denominations of \$50, \$100, and \$500, bearing interest at the rate of eight per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and of an amount sufficient to meet the requirements of this ordinance; and such bonds shall be under the seal of the City of Raleigh, signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the Treasurer, and shall be issued as provided or in section three of this ordinance.
