Mr. G. is also in attendance on the Fair, and no doubt was glad to see Shuford one of the Democratic pioneers in internal improvements in North Carolina. It was a perilous movement of the five to break from party tracks, and vote \$2,000,000 of bonds and debt to build the North Carolina Railroad. Shuford says the times have greatly changed. Members can now vote \$16,000,000 and no responsibility attaches to the set. Two men like Graves and Shuford in the Legislature, would be worth all the carpet-baggers that could stand between Raleigh and Bunker Hill Monument.

COINSOLIDATION OF RINGS.
In 1871 there was a consolidation of railroad, bond and political rings. Less than a dozen "Conservative gentlemen" consolidated with Seapson, Buford and Dr. Hawkins. They sent an agent to buy out the Seapsons. Again they sent to buy out through Dr. Blackwell, of the Yarbors' House, pay \$15,000 and give as a seat in Congress.
