LOUISIANA AFFAIRS. NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 24. It is stated that Choctrove, the editor of Natchitoches Vindicator, was under Federal auspices, and hundreds of others were threatened. Parties generally have generous premonition of warrants and take to the woods. Squads of Federal cavalry operating in several parishes are led by Federal Marshals, but those against whom they have warrants have premonition and generally take to the bush. The registration in the city is 28,000 white and 19,000 black. Thirty three Parishes give 28,000 white and 42,000 black, and leaves twenty-four Parishes to be heard from. The present returns give the blacks 2,000 majority.

FROM WASHINGTON. WASHINGTON, Oct. 24. An informal meeting of the Cabinet was held between 11 and 12 o'clock today. All the members were present excepting Belknap and Delano. Secretary Bristow and Postmaster-General Jewell had a consultation with the President concerning Federal officers in Texas, and read to him the reports which are considered strictly confidential, in relation to them made by special agents. The only Postmasters to be changed are those at Galveston and Houston. The President has already, through the Postmaster-General, requested them to resign, but they have as yet made no response to the Postmaster-General. He can see no good reason for making other changes in Texas, though politicians there are urging removals that the vacancies may be supplied by persons whose chief recommendation is their greater activity in politics.
