THE HAMPION BAT AND BALL.—The question of the championship of the State among the baseball clubs not having been settled at the late State Fair, the following manner of adjusting the matter has been agreed upon:

There having arisen a misunderstanding between the baseball clubs which contested at the late State Fair for the bat and ball offered by the North Carolina Agricultural Society, as a premium for the best club in the State, the Society declined to make the award until the matter can be settled in a manner satisfactory to all.

In order that such satisfaction may be had the Society proposes that the clubs making claims to the prize shall meet at Goldsboro on the second Tuesday in November, and then under the supervision of a committee of five gentlemen appointed by the Society, to play one game, the victors to have and hold the bat and ball as private property, or as the champion club and ball of the State, as they may elect.
