Mr. Editor

I send you the following, taken from the Charlotte Observer. If I had seen 'O. to which this is a reply, you should have had it for publication. I am interested

in the disassion : Oct. 20, 1874. Mn. Epron :- In the Observer of this norning is a communication on "The state debt," over the signature of "O" and purp-ring to be written "by one of the blest financiers in the State."

The writer proposes that the State issue five per centum gold bonds and pay all the old bonds with interest, including insaddle the State with a fine debt of \$20. 000,000 or more, bearing per cent. in gold, These bonds are now selling at 20 cents on the 100. This is heavy to begin with. He then proposes to pay 60 on 100, for all other boarls issued since the war, except the special tax bonds. This would add several millions more to the \$20,000, 000. This c'ass of bonds are now quoted in your paper at 10 per cent, and the State is asked to pay 60! The special tax bonds thinks the State is not morally bound to pay, but proposes to pay ten cents on the dollar. They are now quo-

ied in the Observer at 5 cents per bid. Thus we see 'O' proposes to North Car' olina to assume a bonded debt of \$25. 000,000, payable in gold as a compromise of all her debts, which according to the present modest quotations could be bought for \$6,000,000 or less. This is a most extraordinary proposition to come from a North Carolinian! It sounds very much 'ike the demands of some specula tor in State bonds, and cannot be entertained by thinking men, "O" says "he shall have a share heavily, in the burden and taxation" "necessary in any adjustment." It is possible he might have a larger interest in the gold bonds to be issued. He certainly proposes a heavy burden for all tax paying North Carolinians. He may be an able financier, but
