The Congress of the Argentine Confederation has decided the Republic in a state of siege, and voted the necessary money to enable the Government to crush the insurrection.

The weather in Omaha for the past three days has been very cold, with high winds. The first snow of the season fell on Thursday.

The Union Pacific express westward bound was nine hours late in arriving at Ogden on Thursday night.

George H. Kingsbury, Assistant Receiver of the National Bank Redemption, Boston, was arrested in that city yesterday, charged with embezzling \$31,000.

Three convicted murderers are to be executed on the 13th of November in Pennsylvania. Udderjohk at Westchester, and O'Mara and Erin in the jail yard at Monroe, in Berks county.
