City Intelligence.

THE NEW YORK MARKETS.—In New York yesterday cotton was quiet, with sales of 2,000 bales at 14 5/8-9.

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HON. B. F. MOORE'S OPINION ON CITY FINANCES.

At a meeting of the Board of City Commissioners, Monday evening, November 9th, Mr. Moore for the committee on finance, returned the following opinion delivered by B. F. Moore, addressed as follows, Jno. Nichols, Esq., and other committee:

DEAR SIR: I have received yours of the 7th inst., and would have replied earlier but for reasons which I readily can give.

Question 1. There are now outstanding city warrants, which the city is unable to pay by reason of its heavy indebtedness. Can the city authorities issue city warrants for the same?

Answer: A city warrant is but the admission by the city authorities, of a debt due by the city to whom the warrant is issued; and it follows of course, that if the warrant binds the city, the change of the warrant to a city bond does not change the consideration of the debt; nor does it increase or diminish the obligation of the city to pay it.

Question 2. Is the city tax collector bound to receive warrants or orders, on the Treasurer for taxes? Should he refuse to do so how would the holders of such warrants move to collect?

Answer: If the city warrants are lawful obligations—bona fide debts due by the city, I am unable to perceive how the city can rightfully refuse to pay them.

If the city have the power to become indebted by stipulation by it providing for the payment in advance, yet to be in the power of the city to make debts, and stipulated that they should not be received in payment of its taxes imposed on the creditor, the city might substantially incur the debt by refusing to levy a tax larger than might be necessary to discharge its other debts, and then the city would never have funds with which to pay it.

It is a universal rule of equity and justice, that no creditor who seeks justice from his debtor is allowed to escape doing justice to himself.

Also, that no bond is payable to bearer, but to the person in whose name the warrant may be issued.

It is not lawful to contract by bond or otherwise for the payment of a higher interest than six per cent, for the consideration is not borrowed money.
