DISSOLUTION OF PARLIAMENT. The Legislature of North Carolina is to the people what the Parliament of Great Britain is to the United Kingdom.

Samuel Watts, Esq., made a short speech and offered a resolution condemning the high freight charged on the North Carolina road, and especially the freight on wood from Auburn to Raleigh.

Mr. Geo. W. Phillips offered a resolution calling on the legislature to inspect Judge Watts for bribe taking. Also a resolution expressing the sense of that meeting for a convention to amend the constitution.

SENATOR FROM DAVIDSON. Colonel Alfred Hargraves, the venerable Senator from this county, was in the Senate in 1840, and again in 1844. He went to school to the well-known teacher Rogers, in Hillsboro, in 1824.
