NEW YORK MARKS. In New York yesterday cotton was dull; at 15.00 at 14.75-15.14. Futures closed steady.

POLICE MATTERS. Major Holden has made preparations to police the old Fair Grounds neighborhood thoroughly, hereafter, owing to many complaints in that section, which is becoming diversely populated.

NORTH CAROLINA CHRISTIAN CONFERENCE. This body held its annual session at Hargett Chapel, near Pittsboro, closing on Tuesday evening last.

THE BUSINESS of the body was transacted in much harmony. The sermon of Rev. Dr. Wellons was on Christian Union on the Sabbath, and produced a profound impression.

The Conference endorsed the Graham High School, of which Rev. D. A. Long, A. M., is Principal.

Rev. W. W. Staley was ordained an Elder, and four interesting young men received into the Biblical Class.

The weather was fine, and congregations large from day to day.

The hospitality of the citizens was unbounded.

The prospects of this denomination in this State were never better.

The next annual session will be held at Pope's Chapel, in Granville county, N. C.

General Assembly of North Carolina.

SENATE. THURSDAY, Nov. 19. Senator McShane, President pro tem, called the Senate to order at 11 a. m.

Mr. Hargrave: A petition from the Mayor and Citizens of the City of Raleigh, praying for the removal of the name of the City of Raleigh from the title of the State Constitution.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES. Mr. Latham from the Committee on Propositions and Grievances reported.

Mr. McCauley, a bill in relation to civil or criminal cases. Provides for removal of some to adjacent counties in certain cases. Referred to Judiciary.

Mr. Stanford, a bill requiring the registration of deeds, certain cases. Judiciary.

Mr. Busbee, a bill amending chapter 23 of the Revised Statutes. Judiciary.

Mr. Kerr, a bill for the relief of Clifton Ward, late sheriff of Sampson. Com. on Propositions and Grievances.

Mr. McCauley, a bill amending section 14, chapter 6, of the Revised Statutes. Mr. Cantwell, a bill providing for revising and condensing the Code of Civil Procedure. Judiciary.

Mr. Cook, a bill concerning the sale of deadly poisons. Restricts the sale to physicians, excepting in certain cases. Judiciary.

Mr. Cantwell, a bill to amend and extend aid to disabled soldiers. Military Affairs.

Mr. Cantwell, a bill amending an act in relation to the Halifax and Weldon Railroad Company, and the Wilmington and Weldon R. R. Internal Improvements.

Mr. Latham, an act relating to the commissioners of the county to sell their personal and purchase another. Prop. on Propositions and Grievances.

Mr. Love, a bill for the relief of J. W. Taylor, late sheriff of Henderson county, to collect the arrears of taxes. Prop. on Propositions and Grievances.

Mr. Jenkins, a bill in relation to collection of taxes of Shelby. Prop. on Propositions and Grievances.

Mr. Latham, a bill giving Justices of the Peace jurisdiction to proceedings for forcible entry and detainer. Judiciary.

Mr. Busbee, a bill in relation to larceny. Judiciary.

Mr. Holton, a bill in regard to usury. Judiciary.

RESOLUTIONS. A resolution appointing 7 in the Senate and 12 in the House as a joint committee on the public debt was adopted.

SECOND READING OF BILLS. A bill in relation to the collection of taxes in New Hanover county, which was introduced by Mr. Cantwell on yesterday.

It extends the time for their collection 60 days. Mr. O. again expressed his objection to the bill as being a temporary one. There was no relief for the sheriff. The memorial was signed by a large number of the prominent citizens of Wilmington, asking this relief which they would be able to meet in 60 days.

Mr. Kerr concurred in what had been said, and wished its passage. The bill passed on its second reading, and upon motion of Mr. Cantwell the rules were suspended and it was placed upon its third reading, which it passed, by a vote of 45 yeas; 0 nays. It was ordered to be engrossed and sent to the House.

By leave, Mr. Holton, a bill in relation to per diem. Referred to Committee on Finance.

The Senate concurred in a message of the House, proposing to print 200 copies of the Governor's message for the use of the members, and 100 copies for the use of the Executive office.

Mr. Stanford announced that Dr. Smith, of Wayne, was detained at his room today from sickness.

Senator Waring asked and obtained leave of absence for one day for the Principal Clerk of the Senate.

A message was received from the House informing the Senate that body had passed a bill in reference to the adjustment of the public debt. The bill was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Mr. Graham, a motion that that portion of the Governor's message referring to the penitentiary, public schools, and asylums be appropriately referred, which was so ordered by the President.

Mr. Busbee, a resolution authorizing the Keeper of the Capitol to rent the space in the rotunda to confectioners (sellers of peanuts, &c.) was adopted.

Mr. Stanford, a motion that the Senate take up the bill just transmitted in regard to the payment of the lawful interest of the State was agreed to, and the bill was read and passed its second reading. (It repeals a bill passed in 1868 appropriating certain moneys to the payment of interest upon certain State bonds.)

By Mr. Tate: A bill to repeal the act to pay the interest on the lawful debt.

By Mr. Green: A bill to charter the Watauga and Caldwell Narrow Gauge Railroad. Referred.

By Mr. Mendenhall: A bill to adjust and compromise the public debt. Referred.

By Mr. McRae: A bill to amend sections 264, 265, 270 and 273 of the C. C. B. Referred.

By Mr. McRae: A bill to amend chap. 109, section 15, of the Revised Statutes. Referred.

By Mr. McRae: A bill to amend the act in relation to the payment of the interest on the lawful debt. Referred.

By Mr. Field: A bill to amend chapter 106, laws of 1873-74. Referred.

By Mr. Field: A bill to regulate the rate of interest and prevent usury. Referred.

By Mr. Dorch: A bill to change the time of holding courts in the 3d Judicial District. Calendar.

By Mr. Strong: A bill to organize the militia of the State. Referred.

By Mr. Pinnix: A bill to repeal the act empowering the Commissioners of Davidson county to establish a Teacher's Institute. Referred.

By Mr. Green: A bill to repeal section 4, chapter 16, laws of 1850-51. Referred.

By Mr. Thompson, of Lincoln: A bill to amend chapter 40, section 23, of the Revised Statutes. Referred.

By Mr. Hanner: A bill concerning the homestead and personal property exemption. Referred.

By Mr. Thompson, of Lincoln: A bill to amend the charter of the town of Pinconite. Referred.

By Mr. Fields: A bill to amend the act to construct a public road through the counties of Allegheny and Ash. Referred.

By Mr. Patton: A bill to amend the charter of the Greenville and French Broad Railroad. Referred.

By Mr. Oakesmith: A bill to repeal chapter 171, laws of 1873-74. Calendar.

By Mr. Moring: A bill to adjust and settle the public debt. Referred.

The Speaker announced the following Standing Committees: Committee on Judiciary: Messrs. Strong, McKee, Erwin, Pinnix, Walker, Richmond, Candler, Moring, Meigs, Mebane, Gudger, Boyd, Spears, Stables, Barnett, Dale, Dorch, Fields, and Green. Finance: Messrs. Tate, Richardson, Bryson, of Swain, Patton, Mendenhall, Gash, Reid, of Mecklenburg, Stone, Wheeler, Boyd, Melvin, Pinnix, Mizell and Bravington. Propositions and Grievances: Messrs. Gudger, Walker, of Richmond, Mills, of Stokes, Hicks, of Stephens, Bettis, Foote, Norman, Barnhardt, of Caldwell, Sharp, Mendenhall, and Moore. Counties, Cities, Towns and Townships: Messrs. Bryson, Barnhardt, of Rowan, Johnston, Burnett, Freeman, Wells, Gash, Green, Hooper, Davis, of Haywood, and Thompson, of Lincoln.

Mr. Oakesmith moved that the rules be suspended and his bill to repeal the act in regard to the pecking of fish be taken from the calendar and put on its several readings.

The motion to suspend the rules was rejected.

On motion of Mr. Oakesmith the bill was referred to the committee on propositions and grievances.

On motion of Mr. Tate, the rules were suspended and his bill to repeal the act to provide for the payment of the interest on the lawful debt of the State was taken up. [This bill proposes to transfer to the general fund a sum of \$10,000 now in the treasury which came from special tax bonds.]

On motion of Mr. Mendenhall the bill was referred to the committee on finance.

CALENDAR. Several bills were taken from the calendar and referred to various committees. Mr. Moring's per diem bill came up. It gives to presiding officers \$7 per day; the two principal clerks of each House \$6, and other officers and members \$5 per day. It also abolishes mileage and only allows for actual traveling expenses.

Mr. Trivett moved to lay the bill on the table.

The yeas and nays were called and the motion to table did not prevail by a vote of 48 yeas, 0 nays.

On motion of Mr. Moring, the bill was referred to the committee on salaries and fees.

Mr. Pinnix, by consent, offered a bill fixing the per diem of presiding officers at \$5 per day; members \$3 per day; clerks, \$4 per day; mileage 7 cents. Referred to committee on salaries and fees.

STATE NEWS.

Messrs. Merrick and Glover are establishing a spoke and handle factory on the Neuse, near Goldsboro.

The District Convention of the I. O. G. T., assembled in Goldsboro, today.

The night last week some persons entered the store of Messrs. J. B. Paul & Son, at Spang Hill, and stole goods amounting to over \$300.

Mr. G. Livesey, says the Goldsboro Messenger, shipped thirty quarts of fine sugar, for the purpose of being sent to the State of New York.

Mr. J. J. C. Carter, a resident of Halifax, in this State, on a recent visit to New York attended Dr. Deems' Church of the Strangers, and there received a family Bible the property of Mrs. Wm. Caraway, of Wayne county, which had been captured by one of Sherman's bummers in 1865.

The Bible had a few days before been sent to R. D. Deems by a lady who had taken it from an ex-Federal soldier. Among the family record in the book, the birth, name and baptism of "Chas. Deems Caraway," had been recorded in the Doctor's own hand writing, and it was this that led to the recovery. Capt. Caraway brought the Bible home with him and Mrs. Wm. Caraway and family will doubtless be glad to again be placed in possession of it.

President Grant's remark that the third term had no influence in the recent elections does not receive the concurrence of the *Cherwell Herald*. It alludes to his satisfaction concerning the election of Chamberlain in South Carolina on 6 third term platform, and the defeat of Congressman Robery, in New York, on an anti-third term platform, and adds with an asperity unbecoming an organ: "The President might have added the fact that Senator Conkling, his boss blower on the third term, gave Roberts the cold shoulder and thus assisted in the election of his (Conkling's) law partner, Lord, the Democratic nominee, to Congress. The South Carolina proof only amounts to this, that office-holders have it so thoroughly disciplined that they could make the State Convention do just as they pleased, and because the people of New York State thought that they saw the same influence in control of the Republican machinery in that State, when the Convention adjourned to denounce the third term, they defeated the nomination of that Convention." It is difficult to see how there could be any more truth crowded into that paragraph. - *New York Tribune*.
